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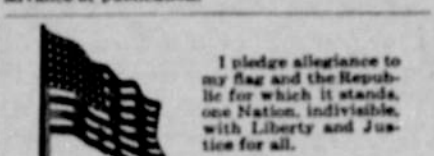

That Banquet

That meeting in Albany last Wed-
nesday night, at which about 125 set
down to the banquet table, was a
humdinger of a boost for Pierce for
governor. The liberal donation of
\$5000 by Jesse Winburn, of Ashland,
to the Pierce campaign fund, and
this banquet also given by him, was
the nucleus around which about all
the newspapermen of the valley
could get first hand information
from Senator Pierce on his stand for
the lowering of taxes in the state.
He stands unequivocally, he says,
for an income tax that will more
nearly meet the requirements of the
state in lowering taxes, and is op-
posed to the income tax bill left upon
the ballot and which is known as the
flat income tax. He wants a grad-
uated income tax, which is right,
and he wants the state electorate to
think seriously upon a severance tax,
a tax that will permit the state re-
ceiving some return from the prod-
ucts of the bowels of the earth and
from the vast amount of timber cut
and sold in the east by easterners,
and this, he says, will help consid-
erably. As it now is, the foreign
capital can come into the state, take
from it its resources and never leave

a cent—and this is being done. He
wants the people to think taxes, plan
lower taxes, yet keeping in mind all
the time, that taxes are necessary
to the perpetuity of the state. He
says that taxes is the great question,
and that nothing else counts, for
what does it matter if other questions
do enter and attempt to draw us
from this question. There is much
in his statements, but there is also
much in some of the other measures
before the people and which has been
njected into the campaign and
which cannot be overlooked be-
cause of their importance, and made
so by powers that are invisible and
which if carried into effect would
wreak ruin upon the taxpayers.
We refer to the compulsory educa-
tional bill. This bill if passed will
heap more and more taxes upon the
people in face of the fact that lower
taxes are demanded. We do not
fear the private schools in Oregon,
they are doing a work that the
public school can do but does not;
they are training the young minds
in this generation true obedience to
studies and discipline, in patriotism,
in respect to those older heads, and
in good citizenship. All this can be
done in the public schools, but
the people are cognizant of the
fact that it has not been done—the
teachers are too busy with other
duties. Besides, the private school
assumes the care of the child to and
from the home and to and from the
school. And the child receives good,
watchful care while in and around
the school.

The public schools are the thing,
the private schools are also the thing
for which they came into existence,
and no one wants to see, or should
want to see, either placed on the
discarded list. We want and must
have no religious controversy in the
politics of the state or nation. There
is room for all of us to worship God
according to the dictates of our con-
science, whether it be Catholic, Pro-
testant or Mohammedism. There is
no need to fear the overthrow of
the government by the Pope of
Rome, by the Methodists or any
other denomination—no kingdom,
no invisible government can be
brought about in this country, the
best, the freest, and the most glori-
ous of all nations under the sun.
Vote no on all measures, and the tax-
payers will be safe, and vote for
the man or men that more nearly
fit your ideas in state government.
