The acquittal of the Indian who was on trial at Dallas last week for the killing of one prohibition enforcement officer at Grand Ronde early in September, meets with the approval of most people who believe in equal justice. It was proven at the trial that the officers had tried to get him drunk and then tried to force him to go and get more booze, with the result that two officers met their death, in a drunken brawl, in which they were the drunker. The other death is also to occupy the time of the court, in which the Indian will again be the defendant. It is too bad when officers of the law must furnish the booze, the guns and other ammunitions of warfare in order to get someone in the toils. It would be better for them, the officers, to adhere strictly to the law in trying to get bootleggers or infractors of other laws—they will get more support from the people and the wiping out of lawlessness will thus be made easier. It is predicted that the Indian will go free in this trial, as in the former.

John Aegerter Dies

John Aegerter, senior of Stayton High school suddenly dropped dead from heart failure on the way to the High school athletic field at 3:15 p. m. Wednesday. He had taken a prominent part in all school affairs but due to the condition of his heart he had not intended to participate in school athletics this year. But feeling the urge to have some part in the football work, as he was a three letter man and this year's athletic manager he put on a suit, intending to remain a spectator. He joined the team running from the gymnasium to the field; the exertion proved too much for his heart and he dropped dead before reaching the field.

He was 19 years of age, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Aegerter, well known residents of Linn county, and besides his parents leaves two brothers, Earnest and David.

His loss is greatly felt by his many friends especially by the students and faculty of the Stayton High school.

The funeral services were held Friday at the Christain church, at 1:30 p. m. conducted by E. A. Palmer, and burial was at Mt. Pleasant cemetery.
