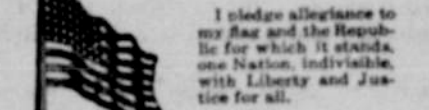

Advertising is stating who you  
are and what you have to offer the  
world in the way of commodity or  
service, and the only man that  
should not advertise is the one who  
has nothing to offer, and he is a  
dead one—whether he knows it or  
not.

After several fruitless attempts to  
have Premier Lloyd George resign  
from his post in England, the radi-  
cals succeeded last Friday, on which  
date he resigned. He had held the  
position for several years and had  
been most successful during that  
time. Bonar Law, born in Canada,  
has been appointed premier by the  
king, and he will form a new cabi-  
net.

Politics is beginning to warm up,  
and will get warmer as election day  
draws nearer. This community has  
three candidates in the field, and  
they are: S. H. Goin, democrat, for  
representative; O. E. Eichinger, re-  
publican, for sheriff; D. C. Thoms,  
republican, for short term county  
commissioner. It would be com-  
munity pride, and ought to be a  
pleasure, for each voter to remem-  
ber these men when they go to the  
polls to vote. They are good, clean  
men, and deserve election. We in-  
vite other communities to assist us.

The city of Portland has at last  
found out that the strikebreakers in  
the late longshoremen's strike had  
been and are L. W. W.'s, and the  
police are rounding them up and  
putting them in jail and ordering  
them to leave the city. Wouldn't  
it be just to other communities to  
place these men in durance vile or  
the rock pile until they are fully  
Americanized and promise to forget  
all else but true allegiance to Amer-  
ica and American institutions? Will  
it help any by driving them out to  
smaller communities, which are less  
able to defend themselves, if they  
are too dangerous for Portland? We  
believe the sooner places like  
Portland takes them in hand and  
handles them there and not pass  
them on to other places, that much  
sooner will we get rid of them—not  
before.

In this busy old world no one  
seems to be satisfied. One man is  
struggling to get justice and another  
is fleeing from it. One man is saving  
up to buy a home, another is trying  
hard to sell his dwelling for less  
than it cost in order to get rid of it.  
One man is spending all the money  
he can earn on autos and theatres  
for his girl and sending her valuable  
presents in hopes that he may  
eventually make her his wife, while  
his neighbor is spending all the gold  
he has saved trying to get a divorce.  
One man keeps a pistol to protect  
himself against burglars, while his  
neighbors doesn't keep one for fear  
of shooting himself or some member  
of the family. One man pays for his  
paper in advance because he can

read it with greater relish, while  
another takes it as long as he pos-  
sibly can without paying one cent  
for it and enjoys it hugely all the  
while. Surely this is a queer old  
world.

### WHO WILL PAY

Representative Fordney, in a  
speech in the house following the  
signing of the new tariff bill, de-  
clared that "there is not the slight-  
est ground for an appreciable in-  
crease in retail prices in any goods,  
foreign or domestic, and whoever  
does so will be a profiteer pure and  
simple."

We have no fault to find with the  
above statement as to its truthful-  
ness, but Mr. Fordney knows and  
we all know that there are thou-  
sands and thousands who deem it  
rather dignified to be classed as "a  
profiteer pure and simple," and will  
not hesitate to pass the extra tax  
imposed by the new tariff on to the  
consumer, so long as our govern-  
ment continues the laxity of the  
present in bringing profiteers to  
justice.

If Mr. Fordney had added to his  
statement the assurance that the  
profiteers would be apprehended and  
given their quick and just deserts  
his assertion would call forth a  
chorus of praiseworthy amens, but  
as it is he has promised nothing and  
said nothing—simply passed the  
buck.

Senator Simmons is author of the  
statement that the new tariff bill  
will cost the American people from  
\$3,000,000,000 to \$3,500,000,000  
annually at the start and double  
that amount at the end.

Such is the wide difference in the  
statements of two political officials  
selected to look after the interests  
of the public. Who is to blame if we  
some times arrive at the conclusion  
that the political interest of some  
officials are nearer their own hearts  
than is the welfare of their constitu-  
ents.

### Personal Liberty at Stake

The compulsory school bill propos-  
ed in Oregon is a piece of radical  
legislation. If by law a parent can  
be prohibited from sending a child  
to a private school, by the same  
token a child or a grown person  
could be required to go to only cer-  
tain specified churches.

The law is a direct invasion of the  
constitutional rights of every citizen.  
We may all have our own religious  
and political beliefs but the freedom  
of our government is trembling  
when by law we try to force the  
beliefs onto another or attempt to  
prohibit one from educating a child  
in a private school that conducts it-  
self in accordance with the laws of  
our country.

The fact that such a law would  
be proposed and even considered by  
any large number of citizens shows  
that instead of progressing in the  
spirit of freedom we are stepping  
back to the days of religious and  
political intolerance.

Oregon should show this measure  
under by the heaviest vote that ever  
killed any proposed piece of radical  
legislation.

after leaving the street car. One  
morning it was raining heavily and I  
had no umbrella. As I alighted from  
the car a young man stepped up to me

gravely bowed and went on his way.—
