discovered that many cases of in-  
sanity can be cured, and have been  
cured, by the extraction of abscess  
teeth.

Another disease, very prevalent  
around here is pyorrhea alveolaris.  
This disease is not an ailment of  
the tooth itself, but of the bony  
socket in which the tooth is im-  
planted. Tarter and unsanitary  
conditions of the mouth favor the  
heart of this disease, and the bone  
surrounding the tooth is slowly dis-  
integrated, pus flows from the socket  
and the teeth became loose and  
tender.

When in its beginning days, this  
can be easily checked by prophylactic  
treatment, but when far advanced,  
extraction is the only remedy.

As the patient is continually swal-  
lowing the pus flowing out of the  
sockets, many complications may  
follow, of which rheumatism, stom-  
ach and intestinal disturbances are  
the most common ones.

General conditions of living have  
much influence on diseases of the  
teeth.

Take Scotland for instance, the  
European country, the dentists have  
more work than in any other. It is  
attributed to the custom of eating  
mush, oatmeal and rich soft foods,  
that are thought to cause this con-  
dition.

Here in the U. S., we have hardly  
better conditions. More and more  
the bread on the breakfast table is  
replaced by mush and wheat flakes  
and such soft dishes that makes  
chewing unnecessary, and there is no  
country where the consumption of  
candies and ice-cream per capita is  
as high as it is here.

Another bad habit for the preser-  
vation of the teeth is the continuous  
chewing of gum and tobacco. It  
wears the teeth down and causes  
them to be worn out long before  
their time.

To sum it up, if we want the  
coming generation to have better  
teeth than the present one, I would  
advise the following:

Do not feed the baby soft food  
only, but give them something to  
chew on, so that their jaw may be  
developed.

When a child is 7 or 8 years old  
have his teeth examined.

The parents and teachers cannot  
be too strict in seeing that the chil-  
dren clean their teeth and have  
their teeth in good condition.

And when grown up, have your  
teeth examined often, and keep  
them scrupulously clean.—Thank  
you.
