HE HAS RESIGNED

Following closely on the election results of November 7, 1922, Freeman H. Newberry, of Michigan, who purchased his seat in the U. S. senate, four years ago, and who was seated by a margin of 5 votes in the senate, last Saturday resigned his seat to take effect immediately. The results from the election was based upon "Newberryism" in national politics, and wherever his name was used it met with jeers from an audience. Newberry, in his resignation, praised his republicanism, said he stood with Harding in his progressive policies (what were they), and felt that his work in the senate was completed when he had voted against centering the league of nations, and for the tariff, supported the ship-subsidy and other measures, and that now the fight was to be renewed against him, he could be of no further use there.

It certainly is gratifying to learn he finally sensed the demands of the people, who are supreme, and steps down and out. He is an old school politician, who believes in the supremacy of the politician, but when his colleague, Senator Townsend, went down to defeat, he saw that the people were taking a hand in national political affairs and that the days of the politician is about over and will terminate as fast as elections roll around.

Facts as adduced in Newberry's trial and subsequent conviction, showed that he and his friends spent nearly \$200,000 for him to be elected U. S. senator—a sum he could not receive in a six-year term as senator. He was sentenced to a term in the Michigan penitentiary, but the supreme court of that state later declared the primary law unconstitutional and he did not serve any of the sentence. Later the U. S. senate seated him and he paid in full by voting against entering the league of nations, in supporting the present tariff, the ship-subsidy bill and other measures, as well as against the soldiers bonus. Yes, he was a Harding progressive, if such a word means reactionary, or against any forward legislation for the benefit of the people as a whole. The measures he supported are not for the people, for they are primarily for the interest of big business, and will burden the taxpayers with more and more taxes.

Now, if Senator Lodge will resign, and he ought to in face of the small margin by which he was elected, there is a possibility of forward legislation being enacted by the coming session of congress, which will take seat on the 4th of next March.

And we suggest that Bob Stanfield, Oregon's junior senator, also take notice. He has much to learn from the recent election. But has he the capacity to learn?

The appointment of Lee J. Giddings as assessor of the late J. S. VanWinkle is a worthy recognition. We congratulate.

BLEEDING US WHITE

Somehow, sometime there will be just recognition of the wants of the people by those who are now assuming to be the dictator of the rights of the people. The recent rebuke by the people of the policies of the present administration seems to have no effect upon the leaders, who are to force a show-down in the ship-subsidy and other measures that guarantee to owners of wealth more wealth if they "can" prove their investment showing no earnings. These investments are the merchant ships and the railroads. Probably the leaders feel that the people have not been sufficiently bled as yet and will keep the process up until there is not a particle of blood left in us—in other words, were to bleed us white.

The ship-subsidy bill is a measure proposed by the owners of merchant marine ships and of purchasers of scrapped ships built by the government during the war. The latter have been assured by the heads of departments of the U. S. government that would be protected by a subsidy bill guaranteeing them a profit on goods shipped to and from the U. S. in competition with foreign owned ships, and the people pay twice for the freighting of imported or exported goods. But what more can we expect when we let money think for us, pass laws for us and otherwise do for us that which we ought to do ourselves. Until we really think and act for ourselves and grab off all.

Shall we continue to let wealth "bleed us white?"

Politics makes strange bed-fellows. Democrats and republicans look alike now since the election.

All that remains now for Governor-elect Pierce to do to fittingly recognize his great benefactor, Jesse Winburn, is to make him his private secretary. He is big enough for the job and would help to bring dignity to the governors effect.

The budget committee for Linn county has made a substantial reduction for the ensuing year, and for which the tax-payer should be thankful. And the county court should see that the budget allowance is not overdrawn. Will they do it?

That principal of the Sellwood school is shortsighted. He whipped a 14-year-old boy and drew a \$50 fine and one day in jail. Now we should initiate a law making all unruly boys and girls in any school the dispenser of chastisement to any teacher who attempts to correct them. Why do we employ principals and teachers, if not to instruct and chastise (if chastisement is necessary)?

Next Saturday is the big day in the history of the Scio High School, and should be unanimously patronized by every citizen of the entire community. The boys and girls who comprise the students therein are our boys and girls—the future men and women. They want to make good if we but give them our moral and financial support. We recently voted overwhelmingly for the public schools, and now is a good opportunity to make our votes good by backing them up. We certainly should do no less. All lovers of patriotism, of our government, of our splendid school system, should be proud of and ever-ready to do all each of us can to sustain and make better our public schools, and next Saturday, Nov. 25, is a good time to start and then keep everlastingly at it.

MADE HIS NAME INFAMOUS

"Black Earl" of Ormonde, in 1580
Spread Desolation in the Lands
of His Enemies.

Thomas, the "Black Earl" of Ormonde, spent the greater part of his life wrestling with rebellion, and when his lands were harried by the Desmond Geraldines, Elizabeth gave him his revenge by appointing him in 1580 military governor of Munster, with a commission to "banish and vanquish these cankered Desmonds." In three months, by his own account, he put to the sword 48 captains, 800 notorious traitors and 4,000 others, and after four years' fighting, Gerald, earl of Desmond, was taken and killed.

The most famous of the long line of Ormonde was James Butler, the twelfth earl, created duke of Ormonde in 1661. He was six times lord lieutenant of Ireland, and, having vehemently opposed a bill prohibiting the importation of Irish cattle into England, which struck a blow at Irish trade, he retaliated by prohibiting the import into Ireland of Scottish commodities. Walter, Count Butler, the dragoon officer who carried out the murder of Wallenstein in 1634, was a descendant of the third earl.
