of government as if he had been

the election to pass.

The legislature is now in full
swing, with Jay Upton, of Prince-
ville, as president of the senate, and
K. K. Kubli as speaker of the house.
Linn county's representatives have
fared real well in committee assign-
ments, both in the senate and the
house. Now, if the membership of
both houses will eliminate a lot of
useless laws, and strengthen those
which have proven themselves mer-
itorious, it will have done a good
work when the legislature adjourns.

The city loses a valuable man
from the council in the resignation
of F. T. Thayer, and sooner or later
it will be universally so stated. For
the past eight years Mr. Thayer has
been on the council, either as mayor
or councilman. In all these years
he rendered unselfish service to the
community, and like all other hu-
man beings, he erred, but it was
from the head and not the heart.
As a private citizen now, the Tri-
