A cannery would add much wealth to our farmers, wholehearted support of the Scio flouring mill, and the Scio milk condensery would create a payroll, the lumber mills around here would bring in more wealth to the community if the community would support them, and these would create a bigger market for the eggs, the wheat, the potatoes, the milk and butter, and all would receive his or her share of the dollars thus expended. At this early stage of the proceedings of the legislature, the Tribune is unable to see where any great saving is to be had by the state in the proposed commission plan of Senator Hall in the conduct of the various activities of the state. In the abolition of the State Accident Commission, the State Labor Commissioner, the Corporation Commissioner, the Public Service Commission, and several of the many other more or less important departments, it is proposed to pay the same salaries to one or more in each department, together with a \$4,500 salary to the head of each of the four departments proposed. This naturally carries with the question, "Will it take less men to operate in the field than it does now, and if not, where is the saving?" Instead of a saving, if we read the proposed bill aright, it will add greater costs to the people. The salaries proposed equals the amount now being paid to the several members of the different commissions, hence the saving looks like added costs upon the people. But we can be mistaken, and if so, we want to be enlightened.

A BANK FAILURE, THE CAUSE

Press dispatches of Tuesday state that the Coulee State Bank of Grant county, Washington, has failed.

William Bouck, deposed Grange Master of Washington, and now leader of a state revolt against unjust conditions, made the statement in Portland Monday that there were 66,000 farmers in Washington and that 10,000 of them are abandoning their farms—letting them go for debts and taxes and moving off. And Mr. Bouck said that many of the farmers were gunny sacks wrapped around their feet in place of shoes.

And this condition of the farmers is the reason for the failure of the state bank. It has been and will be the cause of many business failures.—Producers Call.

Education the Topic

The regular monthly meeting of the Parent-Teacher Association was held at the school house last Thursday evening, and education was the topic. Several timely articles were read upon the subject. A feature of the meeting was a beautiful violin solo by Miss Josie Kotan, accompanied by Miss Eckert on the piano. After the close of the program, those present repaired to the domestic science room, where the basketball girls of the school served generous slices of the large cake which Mrs. D. C. Thoms drew at the show on Monday and had donated to the girls. The cake brought about \$11 at the show and \$2.50 at the serving. A letter in the "Parent-Teacher," written by Mrs. Hayhurst, a former president of the State Association, and who is now on a trip to the Orient, was read, part of which follows:

"A great contrast was the Mohammedan school for boys in Egypt, and at the Al Azkar University, founded 988 A. D. in Cairo, where 12,500 students are being directed in the study of the Koran, it seemed as tho time had been turned back centuries. Most of the committing, which comprises a large part of the course, is done orally, and it was not unlike the murmur of the sea.

"To offset this influence, the splendid, new American University has been established in Cairo, and it pleased us very much when President Watson told us that they are following the plans of Reed College closely, as they regard it as one of the most progressive of modern colleges.

"The Schneller Orphanage at Jerusalem is providing an excellent home under the Near East Relief Fund for nearly 400 orphans—70 of them are blind."

Mrs. Hayhurst visited the Scio Association about a year ago, when she was then State president, and will be remembered by all who met her at that time.
