The Tribune takes this opportunity to apologize to the party who phoned an item of news last Wednesday about a basket dinner to be held at the Federated church on Sunday. We were rushed to death in getting the paper out, and the item was forgotten because the editor did not answer the phone and the party who took the information did not write it down. We hope this apology will be accepted, because we want to give all the news, from whatever source, that is reliable.

What a shock it must have been to some of the political enemies of Henry Ford, when he answered a question as to whether he was a Roman Catholic or Protestant, that he was a Methodist and was going to build a church as a memorial to the memory of his dead father and mother. It is easy to accuse, but sometimes very, very hard to prove the accusation, and Henry has forever put to naught this charge that he is a Catholic. His enemies are daily making him a formidable candidate for president of the United States by their pernicious accusations—and we are not sure but that he would make a good one.

It has happened! And we knew it would! The daily press has been called down for not printing the truth—and it took a fearless state senator of Oregon to do it. He said the Salem Capital Journal and the Portland Daily News were very careless in handling the truth about the senate and some senators! How shocking! Probably if these same senators and their work in the legislature had been clear and above board, these same papers would not have dared to say what they did—and the senator did not say what it was that brought out his condemnation of them. Oh, you pernicious papers, how dare you malign our saintly senators?

It is hoped the people along the county road between here and the Ballin sawmill will grant these mill men the right to use the road for transporting their product to market. This community needs the payroll and the business this mill brings to us. The county court will not object if the residents along the road do not. What say you? Speak up and let these progressive men know how you feel, they want to know and have a right to know. They are putting lots of money into this project, and will put more, if encouragement is given them, and we should encourage every business that will mean greater demand for what we raise and produce here.

Despite the shake-up Mrs. Poin Dexter has created in official Washington by her accusation that wives of department heads and the wives of some senators are using government automobiles for their private use, President Harding says Senator Poin Dexter will be given a good post in the government service, probably that of minister to Chile.

His constituents back home in the state of Washington repudiated him, but Harding thinks he is good enough to hold a place of exceeding responsibility. Likewise, Senator New, of Indiana, is to have Secretary Fall's place in the cabinet. He also was repudiated by his constituents last summer in the primaries, yet he is to be in official circles as an appointee of the President. Probably these distinguished men need financial support from the government so they may live in plenty!

Now that the legislature is on the next to the last week of its session, we hope it will not railroad legislation through that is questionable, and without due consideration of the wishes of the people. It has been so in the past, that important legislation was held up until the last week of the session, and then rushed through without due consideration, and it looks like this will be a replica of former sessions. Tax reduction, an income tax, the commission form of government, and other acts of moment to the people, have not been given much consideration as yet, and we fear these will not until the last hours. Gov. Pierce is doing all he can to get the legislature to really be constructive—but large interests are there to see that the program of the people as expressed at the late election is not carried out. How long will the people stand for this sort of legislation is problematical, but we are like the Oregon Journal, and urge the legislators to beware of the might of the taxpayers of the state if they do not do something for immediate relief.
