O. A. C. Farm Reminders

Tent caterpillars were seriously abundant in many orchard sections last year. The insect occurs at this time as eggs deposited in compact masses in the form of waxy rings about the terminal twigs. These egg masses should be watched for and where observed should be cut out of the trees and removed from the orchard.

The peach and prune twig miner is controlled by the standard application of winter strength lime-sulfur solution. This worm has been seriously abundant as a fruit pest particularly in peaches and apricots. Summer sprays are of little value in their control. It is the exceptional orchardist who can afford to neglect spraying his prunes, peaches or apricots for the control of this serious insect pest.

European foulbrood and cross bees may be eliminated by replacing all inferior queens with good Italian queens. It is the highest step toward success. The names of southern queen breeders appear in any bee journal.

The man who keeps his bees in any old box is in the same class as the one who lets his chickens find their own feed in the grass and looks for eggs in the brush pile.

HOW TO SAVE MONEY WHEN SHOPPING

HOW TO TEST FLOUR

"The very best test of flour is to bake it into the form in which it is to be used." is what every experienced housewife will tell you. But there are some other indications which will show quality, before you go to the expense of making the purchase. These are color, odor, taste, feel and granulation.

If you have been in the habit of considering whiteness as a criterion of good flour, you are wrong. The natural color of flour from hard wheat is a creamy, or slightly yellowish tinge. In fact, a dazzling whiteness is pretty sure to indicate bleaching. A grayish tinge usually means the presence of refuse matter, or that the flour has been ground from spoiled grain. Sometimes, if you look through a magnifying glass, you can detect the tiny black specks in flour of this kind.

Good flour should have a pleasant wheaty odor, and should taste like the freshly ground grain. It should be free from sourness and disagreeable smells.

Test your flour by gripping a handful. If it remains in the shape of the hand when squeezed, and retains the impression of the fingers, you are perfectly safe in buying it. But after a moment, it should fall apart quite readily. Squeezing is also a good way of telling hard wheat flour from soft, as hard wheat flour falls apart more readily.

Flour should never contain so much moisture that it can be pinched up into pellets by the fingers. You can easily detect dampness by thrusting the hand into a sack of flour.

Good flour should be granulated sufficiently to show some slight grittiness when rubbed between the fingers. This will be more characteristic, however, of hard wheat flour than of soft. Too much grittiness may indicate that corn meal has been ground with it. One test for corn admixture is to dry a pinch, but not scorch it, and rub between the finger-tips. Pure white flour will not then feel gritty, but corn, no matter how finely ground, will still remain a little rough. Another test for the presence of cornmeal is to wet a small pinch until it is very soft, then take it between the thumb and fingers and try to spin a thread. If it spins, all is well and good, but if it makes only blobs on the ends of the fingers, very likely corn meal has been added.
