Bible Thought Today

HOW TO WORSHIP: God is the Spirit; and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth.—John 4:24.

Yesterday was the first day of spring, and it is hoped Old Man Jupiter will lay off of his water wagon and give the farmers a chance to do some spring work. Anyhow, we have had no real blizzards or cold spells, like in the middle west, and that is worth something.

It takes some money to run the Portland schools, according to the estimated amounts published from the school board of that city—\$5,285,000 in round numbers. Worth it, though, if the young people are educated and are made real American citizens through the education.

We would be pleased to find a copy of a paper that can be proved entirely free of mistakes or errors, either typographic or in statement of fact. We will be pleased to find a merchant who never made a mistake putting up an order; a lawyer who never lost a case; a doctor who never wrongly diagnosed a case; a postoffice official who never put mail in the wrong box; a woman who never forgets to put in salt while she is cooking or to put tea in the teapot before putting in the water.

It has just come to light that at the last county fair, a sum of \$100 was raised for the purpose of helping the boys and girls who made exhibits at the fair defray the expenses of bringing and feeding their livestock while there, but that no assistance was given to the exhibitors from the Forks of the Santiam. All of the amount went to the south end of the county. We have no objection to the help extended to our neighbors on the south, but when this amount was raised for all, it should at least have been equally distributed. Our boys and girls were politely but emphatically told all the money was used in the south end and there was no assistance for them. The Forks of the Santiam wants to do its part by the fair, wants to help make Linn county become more famous for its livestock, but it also wants to be fairly and impartially treated—nothing more. If the above statement about taking all the money for the south end is correct, it probably will be pretty hard to get the boys and girls clubs in this part of the county to enter next fall when the county fair is staged. Let those in charge of the affair tell the people here just how this disparity came about—we should know.

WHEN NOBODY'S LOOKING

It's easy to enforce speed laws in large cities, and it is easy to keep an eye on motorists in towns like Scio. But as yet no good way has been found to curb the speed fiend who races over the country roads,

whose recklessness is at its height when he is out on a highway with nobody in sight. More and more as our roads get better the lives of careful drivers and people residing along the roads are endangered by the speed fiend who waits until he gets outside the limits of a town or city to "cut loose." Of course arrests are made and fines assessed from time to time. But these arrests and fines seem to be inadequate to stop the practice. It seems to us that right here would be a good opportunity for some of our patriotic legislators to do something for their people by getting their heads together and devising some law, and the enforcement of it, that would make life safe on our country roads from the speed fiend who persists in becoming reckless the moment he thinks nobody is watching him.

STAND BY YOUR HOME NEWS-PAPER

Stand by your home newspaper. If there is anything worth while in your town it is ten chances to one that the home paper had a hand in making it what it is. If there exists any unsightly or unsavory nuisance, twenty chances to one it will stay there until your editor either sees it or smells it and wipes his pen on the town board's breeches. If any body beyond the corporate limits of your town ever learns that there is such a place, it will in most instances be through the medium of your home town paper.

Every town gets its money's worth from its home newspaper. For the newspaper is the wagon that carries all your goods to market. It ought to be kept in good repair. It will pay to grease it with a little subscription money, oil it with advertising and shelter it with your job printing patronage.

Stand by your local newspaper, it is the guardian and defender of your interests, the forerunner and pioneer of every advance movement, and the sturdy advocate of law and order. Take it away and it will not be six months before the town would look as though it had been dropped down and forgotten, business would drag, society would yawn and the grass would grow in the streets and cover the sidewalks.—Beaumont Leader.

Cannot Impose Tax

States cannot impose taxes on mortgages negotiated by the federal farm loan banks, the U. S. supreme court held Monday. It overruled a decision of the courts in Alabama, which upheld a tax of 15 per cent per hundred in accordance with an Alabama law on a mortgage of a federal farm loan bank at New Orleans, signed by D. W. Crossland, of Montgomery county. State laws in conflict in this respect were held unconstitutional.
