the reforestation of worked over
tracts. We need the lumber, but

ette stubs into rubbish or dead grass.

Obituary

Mrs. Huldah Jane Cary, widow of
Robert Cary, an Oregon pioneer of
1850, died at the home of her
daughter in Covelo, California, Sun-
day, April 15, 1923.

Huldah Jane Gillett was born in
Kalida, Putnam county, Ohio, July
26, 1840. She was married to A.
Clark Hudson July 4, 1860, and set
out with him for the Oregon coun-
try by way of New York and the
Isthmus of Panama. They lived for
a time in the Umpqua valley, mov-
ing later to Brownsville, Oregon.
Here death took from her her hus-
band and infant son, John, leaving
her with three small children, Rhoda
Jane, Milton Denman and Huldah
Elizabeth. The two last named
preceded her to the grave.

On September 24, 1868, she was
married to Robert Cary, with whom
she came to the vicinity of Scio to
make home. With the exception of
three short intervals, she spent here
the remaining fifty-four years of
her life. To this union were born
six children, Luella, Robert Lee,
Alice, Francis Gillett, Alma Kath-
erine and Edward Guilford, all of
whom are living. One grandson,
Edwin G. Olson, three step-children,
Roberta, Elizabeth and Miles S.,
and two step-granddaughters, Beu-
lah Powell and Irma Kelsay, all of
whom survive.

Reverend Fellman of Albany con-
ducted funeral services Wednesday
afternoon at the Baptist church, of
which she had been for more than
half a century a member. The text
"And God shall wipe away all tears"
and the song "Asleep in Jesus"
were of her own choosing. The lov-
ing hands of the sons of the house-
hold bore her body to its last rest-
ing place.

Mrs. Cary was a woman of un-
usual intelligence and strength of
character. Her calm and abiding
faith in the power and goodness of
the Infinite left its impress on all
who came within the circle of her
influence.
