KING'S ROBE CHEST

This beautiful painted casket, found in the tomb of King Tut-Ankh-Amen of Egypt, contained the king's robes, decorated with elaborate bead and gold work of lapis-lazuli and turquoise; a gilt headrest like those used in Japan today, several pairs of sandals ornamented with inlaid gold, a black amber necklace, a collar of falcon, and other objects. On the vaulted lid of the chest the scenes represent the king and his courtiers hunting lions, antelopes and other animals. On the two sides are battle scenes.

A Los Angeles firm will soon open a room in Albany, which will be used in preparing berries for barreling and preserving purposes. This enterprise will not only serve as an outlet for many tons of berries, but it will also furnish employment for more than 100 men and women. They already have contracted for over 100 tons of strawberries with which to begin operations.

John Lisa, 48, a resident in the vicinity of Jefferson for the past 20 years, shot and killed himself last Friday. He is said to have been despondent because of a persistent pain in his forehead.

Paving is being laid at Murder creek bridge just east of Albany.

Herman Gleaser was fined \$175 the other day in Albany for having liquor in his possession. On April 14 he was fined \$50 for being drunk and disorderly.

An all day meeting was held at the county farm Sunday. Over 80 people from all over the county attended. Rev. F. B. Fellman of Albany preached in the afternoon. It was also the 35th wedding anniversary Rev. and Mrs. Henry Albers. Mr. Albers is superintendent of the farm.

The Halsey district is considering the proposition of establishing a union high school at that place which will embrace the surrounding territory.

The Albany Brick company is installing a dryer, with a capacity of 70,000 brick and at a cost of about \$1,600. This will enable them to operate throughout the year.

Of the 20 best Oregon demonstration farms, D. W. Porter heads the list with 180 hens which laid an average of 27.33 eggs per hen. Other Linn county co-operators are Clarence Williams of the Lake Creek community, who holds 9th place, Trolinger Bros. of the Munkers community holding 10th place.

About eight months ago H. A. Stannard, manager of the Brownsville lumber yard, ran a half inch fir splinter in his thumb. A physician probed several times for it but could not locate it. About four weeks ago Mr. Stannard contracted pneumonia and the fever caused the thumb to fester so that the splinter came out. It was not decayed.

Automobile racing has been added to the Linn County Fair attractions.

A number of farmers living southeast of Crabtree are raising funds for the creation of a market road from the Providence church to Gregg's station. \$750 of the \$1,000 required has been raised and to this the county will add \$1,000, making a total of \$2,000 for this road.

A. L. Bostwick who has, until recently, been connected with the two Albany papers has formed a partnership with Glenn Loomis, also formerly of Albany, in the Lebanon Criterion.

Fred M. Brown, chief deputy in the game warden's office, has repurchased the Brownsville Times from Jesse R. Hinman.

Brownsville has enjoyed a boom in real estate and business transfers lately.
