## Save Oregon Forests

Forestry is the art of forest management, based on the scientific study of the woodlands. This subject covers such topics as the distribution over the earth's surface, their dependence on soil and climate, and their use and value to mankind.

Since Oregon has one-fifth of all the standing timber in the United States, steps should be taken to boost Oregon by the timber industry. In the United States in 1920, the total cut of Douglas Fir was 6,900,000,000 board feet. Of this amount 33 per cent was produced in Oregon.

Not only has Oregon Douglas Fir, but Yellow Pine, Spruce, Cedar, Hemlock, and other varieties of economic importance, together covering twenty-five million acres, or 5-12ths of the Oregon acreage.

About one-half of the timber in Oregon is found in Government Reserves. There are 16 such Reserves in the state. Lumbermen are permitted to cut and market mature trees in these Reserves after obtaining lease from the United States government.

The timber, or woodland, consisting in considerable part of full grown trees, should be cut over on a selective plan; only those trees should be felled which are nearly or quite full grown, or are much too crowded, or are in some imperfect condition. As far as possible the felling must be managed so that promising trees are not injured by the falling trunks of the trees which are cut. It is estimated that if forests are not cared for there will be a needless scarcity as early as 1940.

Forest fires must be prevented. Most fires are caused by carelessness. Seventy-two per cent of all

forest fires are caused by careless campers. No fires should be kindled during dry weather in the heart of such woodlands except in moderately large clearings free from brush, and these should be carefully watched and put out. Cutting up large tracts of forests into smaller portions by means of roads helps to keep small fires from spreading. However, in warm, dry weather a fire under full headway is seldom stopped until it reaches extensive clearings or bodies of water.

The Oregon forests are our best friends and everything should be done to preserve them, for they make a valuable and beautiful state, such as we all desire Oregon to be.—Frosh, General Science Class.
