May Day Festival Proved

A large crowd was on hand to witness the May Day exercises which were preliminary to the dance. In spite of a long wait and a short program they were well repaid for their attendance. Seldom is the May Festival so artistically and flawlessly dramatized. A quartet of youthful heralds entered with an outburst of song announcing the coming of the queen. Surrounded by attendants and followed by the dancers Her Majesty approached the brilliant golden and lavender throne and seated herself amid an array of beauty. Sir Harry approached and placed the crown upon her head and afterward announced the dance in honor of the queen and the guests. Swiftly the dancers swarmed about the pole like wonderful orange and black fairies. The rapid weaving in and out of the colored streamers and the graceful movements of nimble sprites blended into a spectacle of rare beauty long to be remembered. After two exceptionally clever dances by little Virginia Randolph, the queen and her retinue departed to make room for the festival dance.

Most of the crowd remained to witness and participate in the dance, and others came in such numbers that seats were at a premium. People were present from nearby towns

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
