A new force is being added to the crew of the Silver King mine and they propose to push along briskly their cross cut tunnel. It is now some 300 feet. A machine drill of the latest and most improved design is being used.

Oscar Ingram, who is employed at the Crown mine, was severely injured by a falling rock last week.

It is said that Lotz & Larsen will start their concentrator in the near future. The drift is now in some 1000 feet and large bodies of ore have been encountered. They are building a flume along Gold creek for power purposes.
