THE ASSASSIN

The second murder of a Linn county sheriff within a year has occurred—C. M. Kendall and W. J. Dunlap, his successor. Both good men and fearless; both foes to lawlessness; both killed in the pursuit of their duty. One small crime led to murder—a moonshiner in the first instance, two automobile thieves in the second. What can be done to suppress such catastrophes is the big problem. Capital punishment has no terror, it seems; churches have not solved the problem; patriotic societies are also in the dark. How can our peace officers be protected? Must men be led to the high office of sheriff and become a target for the assassin's bullet? Are we to permit the fair name of Linn county to be made blacker? Since other deterrent measures have failed, especially our courts, there is, in our opinion, but one effectual method left open, and that is "Judge Lynch." We shudder at the suggestion, but all other measures have failed, desperate methods must be employed. If our courts and juries are failures, and the hangman's knot has no terror, then the ire of the people with the aid of "Judge Lynch" should be tried. A good man, a fearless officer, Sheriff Dunlap, has been murdered, and we hope he will be avenged, and speedily so.
