Ettersburg Strawberry Best

Strawberry growers in Linn county, and especially the Forks of the Santiam, will be pleased to know about the strawberry investigations carried on at O. A. C. A great number of varieties and seedlings have been experimented with, and up to the present Ettersburg No. 121 is by far the best variety both as to yield and canning quality. On the poor types of lands it far surpasses any other variety. On the river bottom soils it has not promise quite so surely; some years yielding very heavily and other years lightly and thereby making it not as uniform in soils on river bottom land as on other lands. It appears to be more frost resistant than other varieties, and experience has shown that the best distance to set plants is in rows three feet wide and plants two feet apart in the row.

Tony Craft Buried

The remains of Tony Craft, aged about 30, nephew of Ad Craft, who died on the Panama Canal on March 13, 1923, while in the service of his country, arrived in Albany last Saturday and Sunday were taken to Providence and placed in their last resting place.

When the call for volunteers was issued in 1917, Tony was among the first to answer and served throughout that memorable conflict, and when his term of enlistment ended he again enlisted and served in the U. S. army until death claimed him from the ranks. He has paid his debt to his country and humanity. Besides his uncle, he is survived by his mother, Mrs. D. H. Brown of Salem, and other relatives.

Oregon's Wonder Places

A new 40-page illustrated booklet containing detailed description of Oregon, the summerland beautiful; its sandy beaches, mountain resorts and camping places, and information about hotels and cottages, has just been issued by the Southern Pacific Company. Thirty-five thousand copies have been printed for free distribution and are being widely distributed throughout the United States. The cover and reproduction of Crater Lake on the center spread are works of art in four colors.

Is Constructive Statute

The Transportation Act of 1920 is a "constructive statute inaugurating a new regime for the better government and regulation of the railroads of this country." In effect it repeals the Sherman Act insofar as the anti-trust law applies to the relations between the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific.

The above is the burden of a brief made public Monday by the Southern Pacific Company setting forth arguments upon which the railroad will rely in the hearing now being held in the United States Circuit Court at St. Paul, on the company's petition for a decree carrying into effect the Interstate Commerce Commission's order authorizing the Southern Pacific to continue in control of the Central Pacific.

The brief concludes: "The matter now before the court is a case where a structure once condemned as illegal has since been legalized by subsequent legislation. It is one where the supporting statute upon which a suit is based has been repealed."

"It is the duty of the court now to render such a decree as it would render if on Feb. 6, 1923, Congress had repealed the Sherman law."

LARGE CROWD ENJOYS PROGRAM

Community Club Re-Elects L. E. Gilkey as President—To Meet at Shelburn

About 400 people assembled at the gym Monday night to enjoy the splendid program which the entertainment committee of the Community Club had provided, and so far no one has had a complaint to file against it.

A little after eight o'clock the program was started by the pupils of the grades of the Scio schools with the beautiful cantata, "Brownie Band," which they gave on May 18th. If anything, the youngsters were better Monday night than they were on the previous rendition. The large audience showed their appreciation by roundly applauding each number.

Automobile Accident

Weinert T. Tolch of Seattle was killed and his companion, R. A. Thomas, suffered a broken rib when their car overturned near the covered bridge on the Albany-Corvallis road, two miles southwest of Albany, Tuesday afternoon. Upon reaching the grade approaching the south end of the bridge, Mr. Tolch, pulled out to make room for a passing truck and went too far to the right, into soft gravel. The car skidded, rolled down the embankment for twenty feet and landed upside down. The back of the front seat fell across Mr. Tolch's chest, crushing it. Medical aid was summoned but Mr. Tolch died a few minutes after the physician arrived. Mr. Thomas said that he blamed no one for the accident and that no inquest would be asked, but he did think the county should have a guard rail at this place.

Mr. Tolch was 45 years of age and leaves a wife and two children.

The car is believed not to be damaged beyond repair.
