Let every man who owns or operates an automobile or motor truck resolve to repeat this slogan each day—I WILL CROSS CROSSINGS CAUTIOUSLY. There is no need of stating what the result would be if the motorists of this country followed out this slogan.

The United States supreme court has just decided that states cannot forbid the teaching of German in the schools of their state, as it is an abridgement of personal liberty. Some lawyers say this decision will have considerable effect upon the school bill passed by the people at the November election last year.

SUGAR PRICES

It will soon be time to dig up those old wartime recipes on how to can fruit with the minimum of sugar, judging by the way that commodity is soaring skyward, with another raise of \$1.50 per sack in the offing. Wholesale prices are now between \$11 and \$12. The worst feature of the raise is that there does not seem to be the scarcity to demand a rise in price like this. A commission has been appointed to look into an alleged combine to boost prices, but commissions are notoriously slow in coming to conclusions, and in the meantime the canning season will be over. A boycott of a month or so on sugar, as now going on in some places, if universally practiced, would be more effective, for people have learned to doubt commissions and the "investigated" have no fears.

COOPERATIVE MARKETING

There are many people who believe that cooperative marketing offers more of advantage to the producer than any other means now proposed. Through it the producer is enabled to help himself, which is just exactly what the producer wants, for he believes in his own ability to work out his own destiny if he has an open field and a fair opportunity. For these reasons the cooperative plans are being formulated and pushed ahead in many places. There are many producers in Oregon who know to their own satisfaction the financial advantages derived from cooperative marketing, while no doubt a few have met with disappointment. Those who have stayed with it have found it good, even though it was tried in but a small way.

developed largely in the state during the coming season in many fields and with many products. The producer can now receive much aid from the state through State Marketing Agent Spence and his able assistant, Chief Inspector Sikes. While the state does not handle the organizing nor selling end, its resources for gathering valuable data is to the advantage of the producers of Oregon, which can be taken advantage of by any grower or group of growers. "In union there is strength" applies as well to the producer as it does to anything else, and if the producer prospers the whole nation prospers.

JUSTICE STOPPED

We want it understood that the Tribune is for law and order, in both high and low places, and while its editor is against capital punishment he will support that law and urge its use in all cases which are tried by 12 men and they have found the defendant guilty of first degree murder and the sentence to hang is imposed, unless that sentence is secured upon circumstantial evidence, in which case it might come to light some day a gross injustice was done.

The point at issue now is: L. W. Peare, a rancher in Coos county, last fall choked his wife to death while under the influence of moonshine liquor, then poisoned the dogs and cats on his place, and went to the home of a neighboring rancher and killed him. He was arrested, indicted by the grand jury, tried by a competent jury and plead guilty, alleging insanity at the time of committing the crimes. The jury rendered a verdict of first degree murder, alienists proving the defendant perfectly sane, and he was sentenced to hang on Saturday, June 2. On Friday, June 1, Peare's attorney filed a motion for appeal, thus automatically stopping justice in compliance with a legal court procedure.

This condemned man tried to commit suicide while in the Marshfield jail awaiting his trip to "murderer's row" in the state penitentiary at Salem. Thus again has some lawyer stopped justice from being carried out according to law and evidence. No one except this attorney has interceded in the murderer's behalf, and it will be months before the execution will take place, and probably never. Maybe the ranch hasn't been used up yet! If we have capital punishment for the suppression of murder in Oregon let's use it and suppress; if not, let's repeal it and save the lawyers this extra work of beating the gallows.

In the circuit court Monday John L. Kelly was granted a divorce from Gladys Kelly by default. He was given the custody of their minor child, Jack G., aged five.
