**Tells of Trip Home**

Gilkey, June 13, 1923.

To the Editor:

I will now submit a few lines telling you of our journey home. We left Santa Ana June 2. Drove thru Los Angeles and to Glendale, where we visited Mrs. Ella Miller and her daughter, Mrs. Marcella McLeod. Mrs. Miller grew to womanhood here and will be remembered as Ella Moore. When I was at Glendale about seven years ago it was but a small town—it is a city of 35,000. It claims the most rapid increase in population of any city in the U. S. We were entertained most royally at the beautiful home of these Oregon friends.

We then went thru Hollywood and on to Ventura, where we saw thousands of acres of lima beans growing and oil wells on the beach and out a short distance in the ocean. We were most happily surprised at Ventura to meet Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Clem; found we had parked our car right beside theirs; seemed providential. They had been spending a few days in the southland and were on their way home to near Sacramento. They camped with us two nights and journeyed with us as far as Los Gatos. The first night we camped at Santa Barbara. Mr. Clem drove over the city, showing us the sights, among which was the Arlington hotel. The second night we camped at Salinas.

We then went to Stanford University to visit at the home of my uncle, Charles Gilkey. We enjoyed seeing the grand university buildings and grounds, which it is said cost 30 million. The memorial church at Stanford is beyond description. We visited at Alameda, then on to Point Richmond where we took a ferry to San Quentin; did not go to the prison, however. Passed thru Santa Rosa and saw Luther Burbank's gardens and home; we that we saw the man himself directing some work being done in his garden.

We passed thru the great redwood forests, over 100 miles of the largest trees I have ever been privileged to see; they claim they average about 300 feet in height, some taller. Was told the Hammond Lum ber Co. have large holdings here. Very few of the trees have been cut; where we traveled.

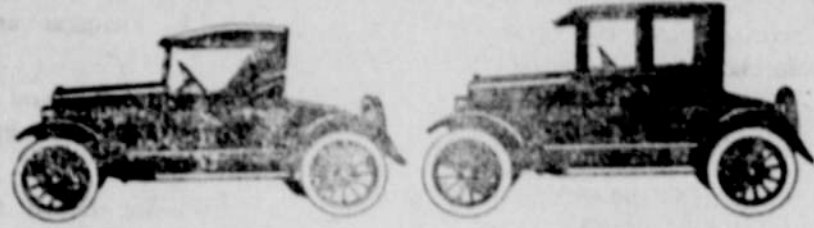
We found good roads as far as Eureka, where we camped for the night. From there on to Crescent City they were very rough; traveled over mountains all day. A great deal of the time we were on the side of a mountain overshadowing the ocean, and sometimes the road ran almost into the water. We enjoyed the scenery, but would advise one going to California to take the valley road.

We passed a great many tourists from New York, Ohio, etc.; they smile and wave a glad hand, and it makes one feel good when in a strange land.

We reached Banner Farm Sunday and tho I enjoyed every minute of my trip, the home coming was the happiest part of my journey. My cousin and wife left Tuesday morning to attend the rose show and go to their home in Washington.
