**City Council Met**

The city council met last Thursday night in regular session, having delayed the regular meeting one week on account of the high school and grade school exercises. All members were present except the mayor.

The regular monthly bills were read and allowed.

The light and water committee made report upon the condition of the water supply of the city and the necessity of securing better water for the use of the citizens. The Scio Mill served written notice on the city that it would commence cleaning out the canal in about two weeks, and as this is the source of the present water supply, some way must be quickly provided to furnish water. The committee recommended that wells be driven to secure the needed water for the city, and the use of the canal and waterwheel for fire protection. It was pointed out that water can be found in abundance at a depth of 12 to 14 feet. Upon motion, the committee was authorized to drive a test well. The cost will be negligible, and if found of sufficient capacity enough wells will be driven to provide good pure water for all purposes.

The council adjourned to meet in regular session unless sooner called by the mayor.
