This Plant Was Big

Last Friday Mrs. Frank Lindeman of near Jordan sent to the Tribune office one plant of the Ettersburg strawberry that was the biggest of the kind we have ever seen. It stood about 18 inches tall and had 410 berries on the vines. This strawberry is said to withstand frost and to be able to produce four to six tons per acre, which is mighty good production, but this depends upon the soil in which it is planted and the care taken of it. It is said the canneries cannot get enough of this variety of berry.
