### Crowd Small; Speech Fine; Pupils Happy

Last Thursday night the gymnasium was the scene of one of the prettiest sights witnessed here in many a day—when the several 8th grade graduates in the Forks of the Santiam met there to receive their diplomas and hear an address by Congressman W. C. Hawley. The meeting was presided over by President Gilkey in behalf of the Community Club, under whose auspices the affair was held.

At June meeting of the Club, a committee composed of J. W. Miller and H. E. Tobie, was named to arrange for a joint exercise to commemorate the graduation of the students from the eighth grade, and the results show their efforts were a success. While every school which had a graduate was not represented, yet there were more than 20 on the platform when the call to order was made.

A four-piece orchestra rendered special music during the evening. The Scio graduates gave a deserved tribute to the grand old flag; Luella and Violet Greshaw of Dist. No. 19 sang a beautiful duet; recitation by Evelyn Huntley of Dist. No. 9; original poem by Bonnie Sutherland of Dist. No. 77; recitation by Frank Shores of Dist. No. 76, and a beautiful solo by Leta Couey completed the program before the introduction of the speaker of the evening, Congressman Hawley, who was presented by Prof. H. E. Tobie.

Thanking the introducer for his remarks, Mr. Hawley delved immediately into his speech. Among the high spots we chronicle but a few, as space forbids a full report.
