Cows Pay Well

J. N. Long is a firm believer in his four cows, and he has a right to be proud of them. He does not feed them any better than any man ought to get the results they are bringing him. For the month of June he received a check from the Scio Condensary for \$91.50, almost \$23 per head. The first 15 days of the month they tested 4.1 and the last 15 days 4.4, which is a good average and one that brings home the coin. Norman sells his milk the year around to the Scio Condensary, and says he finds he always gets what is coming to him from the concern. Anyway, he says it helps to keep the money in this community to do business with those who are a part of the community life, and he considers the condensary the biggest part of the community uplift. Each cow produced a little over a half ton of milk for the month—total 4168 pounds to be exact.

Scio Wins Third Game

In the "rubber" game of baseball, played between Scio and Stayton on the local diamond last Sunday, Scio was the victor. It was one of the best and prettiest games played here this season, as both teams played tight ball and really bordered on big league ball. There were no scores until in the sixth inning, when Scio ran up two, and again in the seventh it scored three more and in the eighth it annexed two more, while Stayton was only able to capture one run in the seventh inning. Both teams were in excellent condition, and showed that every member could hold down his part of the game. There were no particular stars on either side.

The guide in reaching Albany directs the travel through Corvallis and gives no account of the Pacific highway extending south through Linn county.
