Boy nature is not inherently inclined to such exploits. Somebody is contaminating the children. These things cannot be wholly the fault of the boys. There must be a delinquency of parents as well as a delinquency of their children. Perhaps in many cases it is laxity by parents in knowing the associates and doings of their children.

All in all, how can parents escape a chief responsibility for juvenile delinquency? Why do not the authorities trace out the history in individual cases of boy delinquency and tell it to the world?—Oregon Journal.
