

MAN ASKS AND GOD ANSWERS QUESTIONS ON SIN'S PENALTY

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What Scriptures show that death as
sin's penalty means destruction?

Jeb 31: 3: Is not destruction to the
wicked? Ps. 9: 5: Thou hast destroyed
the wicked. Thou hast put out
their name forever and ever. Ps. 37:
28: But the transgressors shall be de-
stroyed forever; the end of the wicked
shall be cut off. Ps. 145: 20: The
Lord preserveth all them that love
Him; but all the wicked will He de-
stroy. Is. 1: 28: And the destruction
of transgressors and of the sinners
shall be together. 1 Cor. 3: 17: If
any man defile the temple of God,
him shall God destroy. Phil. 3: 19:
Whose end is destruction. 2 Thess. 1:
9: Who shall be punished with ever-
lasting destruction.

1 Tim. 6: 9: They . . . fall into
temptation and . . . into many
foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown
men in destruction. 2 Pet. 3: 16: In
which [St. Paul's Epistles] are some
things hard to be understood, which
they that are unlearned and unstable
wrest unto their own destruction.

2 Pet. 2: 1, 12: There shall be false
teachers among you, . . . even de-
nying the Lord that bought them, and
bring upon themselves swift destruction.
These are as natural brute
beasts made to be taken and destroyed.
Ezek. 22: 27: Her princes . . .
like wolves ravening the prey . . .
destroy souls. Matt. 10: 28: And fear
not them which kill the body, but are
not able to kill the soul; but rather
fear Him which is able to destroy
both soul and body in hell. Acts 3:
23: It shall come to pass that every
soul which will not hear that Prophet
shall be destroyed.

What Scriptures show that death as
sin's penalty means extinction?

Job. 6: 16, 18: My brethren have
dealt deceitfully . . . and as the
streams of brooks they pass away.
They go to nothing, and perish.
Ps. 37: 10, 36, 38: For yet a little
while, and the wicked shall not be;
yea, thou shalt diligently consider his
place, and it shall not be. I have seen
the wicked in great power; . . .
yet he passed away, and lo, he was
not. Ps. 104: 35: Let the wicked be
no more. Ps. 49: 12: Man being in
honor abideth not; he is like the
beasts that perish.

What does Christ's death as our
ransom prove to be sin's penalty?

Matt. 20: 28: Even as the Son of
Man came . . . to give His life a
ransom for many. 1 Tim. 2: 6: Who
gave Himself a Ransom for all. Is.
53: 5, 8, 10, 12: He was wounded for
our transgressions; He was bruised
for our iniquities; the chastisement
of our peace was upon Him; He was
cut off out of the land of the living;
for the transgression of my people
was He stricken. Thou shalt make
His soul an offering for sin. He hath
poured out His soul unto death;
and He was numbered with the trans-
gressors; and He bare the sin of
many.

1 Cor. 15: 3: Christ died for our
sins, according to the Scriptures. Rom.
5: 6, 8, 10: In due time Christ died
for the ungodly. . . . But God
commendeth His love towards us in
that while we were yet sinners Christ
died for us. We were reconciled to
God by the Death of His Son. Rom.
4: 25: He was delivered for your of-
fenses, and raised again for our justi-
fication.

2 Cor. 5: 14: If one died for all,
then were all dead. Heb. 2: 9: But
we see Jesus, who by the grace of
God should taste death for every man.
1 Pet. 3: 18: For Christ also hath
once suffered, the just for the unjust,
that He might bring us to God, being
put to death in the flesh.

How can we be saved from sin's
penalty?

(1) Repentance. Luke 24: 47: Re-
pentance and remission of sins should
be preached in His name among all
nations, beginning at Jerusalem. Acts
3: 19: Repent . . . that your sins
may be blotted out. Acts 5: 31: Him
hath God exalted with His right hand
to be a Prince and a Savior, for to
give repentance . . . and forgive-
ness of sins.

(2) Faith. John 3: 14-15: Even so
must the Son of Man be lifted up, that
whosoever believeth in Him should not
perish, but have eternal life; for
God so loved the world that He gave
His Only Begotten Son, that whoso-
ever believeth in Him should not per-
ish, but have everlasting life: for
God sent not His Son into the world
to condemn the world, but that the
world through Him might be saved.
He that believeth on Him is not con-
demned. John 5: 24: He that . . .
believeth on Him that sent Me hath
everlasting life, and . . . is pass-
ed from death unto life. John 20: 31:

These are written that ye might be-
lieve that Jesus is the Christ, the Son
of God, and that believing, ye might
have life through His name. Acts
10: 43: Through His name whosoever
believeth in Him shall receive remis-
sion of sins. Acts 18: 28, 29: Through
this man is preached unto you the
forgiveness of sins, and by Him all
that believe are justified from all
things.

John 3: 18: He that believeth not
is condemned already, because he
hath not believed in the name of the
Only Begotten Son of God.

HOW TO SAVE MONEY WHEN SHOPPING

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TO KNOW IF IT IS "ALL WOOL"

When you go to buy woolen ma-
terial, there are many pitfalls you
have to learn to avoid. It is quite
true that most of us cannot afford to
buy our cloth made up of all new
wool, but at least we want to be able
to tell when a cloth is made up of
cotton and wool mixed, or all new
wool.

The peculiar felting quality of wool
makes it possible to conceal a large
amount of cotton in its fibers. Now
this may not always be any great dis-
advantage, and it is certainly more
desirable to buy a good, firm piece of
part-wool dress goods, when the price
is right, than a cheap, inferior grade,
even if it is "all wool." A cardinal
point every shopper needs to fix in
her mind is that "all wool" is not nec-
essarily good wool.

Perhaps the greatest objection to a
mixture of wool and cotton is the un-
even shrinkage of the two, which
makes it hard to keep the garment
well-pressed and in shape. Often it
is the presence of cotton that causes
a wool skirt to be baggy at the knees
and to sag at the back and sides,
wherever there are long seams.

Then, too, a large percentage of
cotton is likely to give trouble with
the dyes. This would not apply to
white woollens, of course, but in col-
ored goods, especially those of very
dark colors, the cotton may not hold
the dye well. As you know, all dark
colors tend to be fugitive on cotton.

It is perfectly possible to determine
to your own satisfaction whether there
is cotton in a wool sample. Pull out
some of the threads and burn them.
A cotton thread burns much more
quickly than a wool one, and with
more flame; wool chars, leaves a crisp
ash, and smells like burnt feathers.
So the one that has the worst smell
contains the most wool!

The most accurate tests, of course,
are the chemical ones, and the house-
wife does not have equipment for try-
ing these. But there is one, and the
very best one at that, which any one
can try. Take a little caustic soda
or potash, and dissolve in a pint of
water. Roll your sample of cloth in
this solution. It will dissolve any
wool, but leave the cotton unchanged.
If your sample is all wool it will be
entirely dissolved!

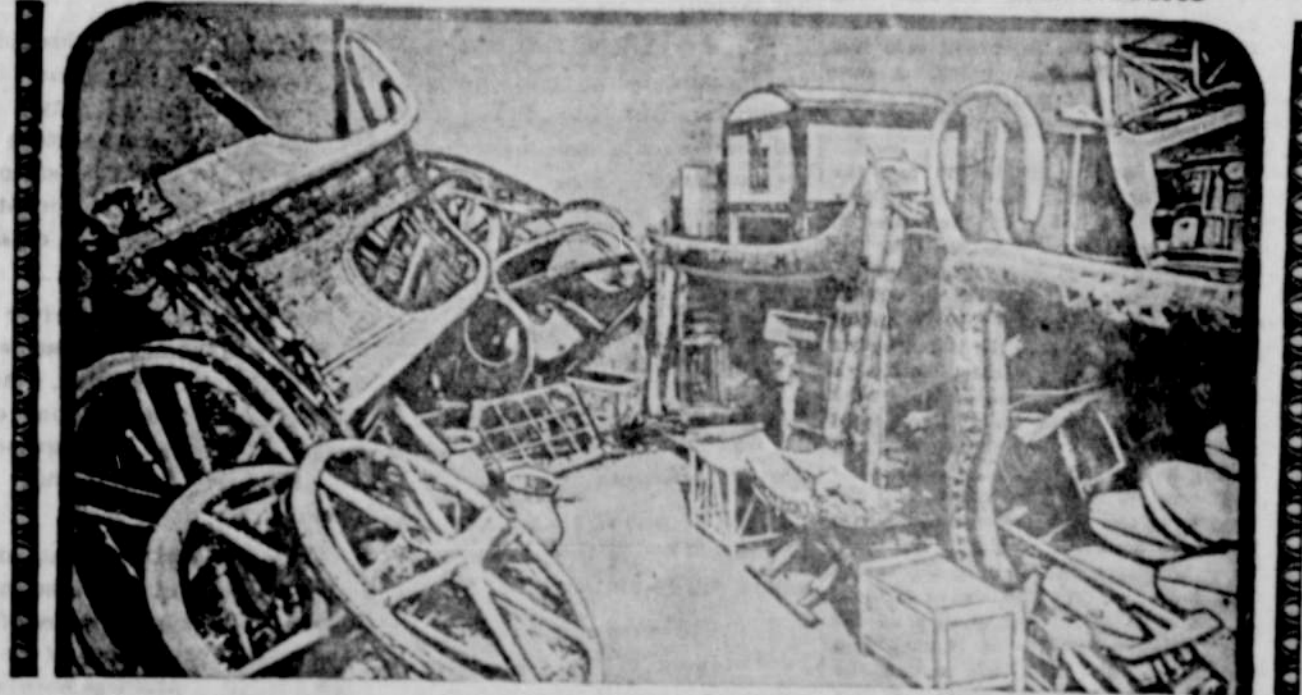

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In this photograph of the antechamber of the tomb of Tut-Ankh-Amen, king of Egypt more than thirty centuries ago, the principal objects seen are the king's stool, made of solid ebony with ivory and having gold mountings; a large royal ceremonial gilt couch; the king's throne which is covered with gold and silver and inlaid with precious stones; a wood trellis stool, a large wooden casket; a carved wood and ivory chair of exquisite workmanship; wheels, bodies, poles, harness and other parts of four chariots; wood gilt trellis work from an object of unknown use.
