It is announced that E. T. Trofiter, manager of the Linn county fair, will have an office in the First National Bank at Albany.

Governor Pierce has appointed Archie C. Miller of route 3, Albany; Edward Myers, Scio; and J. C. Mayer, Lebanon, from Linn county on the tax supervision and conservation commission. This is in accordance with a law passed by the last legislature.

Funeral services for Joseph Keeber, 83, of Lebanon were held Sunday afternoon. He had been a resident of Linn County 48 years.

Three thousand blue, red, white, pink, and purple prize ribbons have been printed for the Linn County Fair.

Mrs. Mary E. Eppley, pioneer resident of Jefferson, died Friday night at the age of 74.

The J. W. Cusick & Co. Bank and the First National Bank at Albany have consolidated. This is now the largest bank in the state outside of Portland.

The firm of Loomis & Bostwick, which has been publishing the Lebanon Criterion and the Brownsville Times has been dissolved. Mr. Bostwick will continue to publish the Criterion and Mr. Loomis will take over the Times.

The road to Cascadia, Linn county's summer resort, is now open and is reported to be in good shape.

Leonard L. Busick, of the J. L. Busick & Sons chain of grocery stores, died the latter part of the week in Springfield, Calif., where he had gone in the hope of regaining his health.

A. C. Heyman, Linn county agent, is the author of an article in the current issue of the "Country Gentleman" describing the poultry farm of L. E. Arnold, near Lebanon.

The world famous cow, Darling's Jolly Lassie, with a record of 1141 pounds fat, owned by Pickford Bros. of Marion, Ore. will be a special exhibit at the Linn county fair.

Benjamin F. Looney, 81, pioneer resident of Oregon, died at his home near Jefferson Sunday. He crossed the plains with his parents in 1843 at the age of one year.

The descendants of Thomas Alpine, pioneer of 1847, of the Dever neighborhood, held their first family reunion in 39 years last Sunday.

Percy Talent was drowned in the Calapooia river at Brownsville Sunday while swimming. It is thought he had a sudden attack of heart failure.

The building at the corner of First and Ellsworth Streets in Albany is being razed to make room for a service station. This is thought to be one of the oldest landmarks in Albany. It is a part of the donation land claim of Thomas Monteith and has been used as an implement store for the last 50 years.
