The Self-Help Plan

Under the leadership of its new president, Clarence W. Green, Albany College is inaugurating a new plan called The Student Self-Help plan of education.

Beginning with the College year 1923-'24, Albany College guarantees to one hundred deserving high school graduates the opportunity to earn the greater part of their way through college. It does this by securing positions for the college student to work in and about Albany, in college buildings, and on the college farm. The college is endeavoring to secure at least one hundred scholarships that will enable the college student to secure a year of college work through the payment of \$100 and working twenty hours per week.

The teaching staff will be prepared to care for two hundred students this year. However, of this number, the college can at present guarantee full-time student self-help opportunities for but one hundred students.

Admission to the college under this plan is obtained by application in writing to the president on blanks which are furnished prospective students.

A student who holds an Oregon Conference Scholarship will be given credit for \$50.00 of the \$100 that the student pays for tuition, student activities fees and laboratory fees.

The college year opens on September 17th. Application for admission should be made as soon as possible as it takes some time to complete arrangements.
