As soon as the news reached Albany a searching party was organized. They being unsuccessful, a professional grapppler was called from Portland Friday. The body was found Sunday three miles below Harrisburg.

The funeral was held at Hubbard, his former home, Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Whitney was aged 33 years. He is survived by his wife and four children; his mother and one sister. He took up his residence in Albany about a year ago.

## Scio Boy Makes Good

Max, the 15 year old son of J. F. Wesely decided two years ago to engage in the hog business, and with a small sum of money he had saved, he purchased a large type Duroc-Jersey Gilt from a breeder at Grand View Wash., paying \$84 for her. Her mother sold for \$850 plus express from Minnesota.

He has just sold seven of eight pigs from this gilt, realizing \$113 for them and has one of the best ones left, besides the mother, which is now worth more than at the time he bought her.

Mr. Wesely has shipped hogs to this community for some time, and is doing this as a help to get good stock introduced in the vicinity.

## Pacific International Live Stock Exposition

The thirteenth annual Pacific International Live Stock Exposition will be held at North Portland, November 3-10 this year. The new premium list is out, and those who contemplate exhibiting may secure copies by writing to O. M. Plummer, General Manager, 211 Northwestern Bank Bldg., Portland, Ore.

The premiums for livestock and the horse show total about \$90,000, placing this exposition it the same class with the greatest livestock shows and expositions in America.

The beef cattle division takes in Shorthorns, Herefords, Aberdeen-Angus, Milking Short Horns, and Red Polled cattle. Large and representative exhibits of all these have been promised already for 1923.

The dairy cattle division includes Holsteins, Jerseys, Guernseys, Ayrshires and Brown Swiss, and it is expected that some of the world's record cows will be present again, and that the record-breaking numbers of last year will be surpassed.

The sheep department includes all the usual breeds—Rambouillets, South-downs, Dorsets, Cheviots, Corriedales, Romneys, Costwolds, Lincolls and Leicesters, with a breed new to the exposition—Suffolks. The usual liberal premiums are offered for Angoras and three breeds of milk goats.

In the hog division there will be Poland Chinas, Duroc-Jerseys, Chester Whites, Berkshires and Hampshires. Futurities of \$1,000 each are offered by the two first-named breeds.

The Percheon, Belgian, Shire and Clydesdale draft horses and Jacks are well supplied with premium money.

The fat stock classes are strong again this year.

The boys' and girls' clubs are offered over \$4,000 in premiums and for contests and judging. The pig feeding contest along carries \$1,000, and large exhibits for this event will come from all parts of the northwest.

As usual the judges for all livestock will be men of the highest ability and authority obtainable, and will come from all parts of the United States and Canada.

## U. of O. Opens October 1.

High school graduates who plan to enter the University of Oregon this fall are requested by the officials to be in Eugene Sept. 25. The regular freshman English examination will be held on that date.

Registration dates for boys and old students will be Thursday and Friday, Sept. 27 and 28.

## Big Fire at Corvallis

Fire destroyed the Rickard garage and some adjoining buildings Thursday afternoon at Corvallis. The garage contained 45 automobiles, all of which were destroyed except four. The owner estimates his loss at from \$60,000 to \$70,000 with insurance to only about one-tenth cover it, most of the autos were insured.

The Beaver Laundry, which adjoined the garage, suffered a loss of about \$6,000.

For a time it was feared the entire front running southward would be destroyed. Help was called for and the Albany fire department started but turned back on learning that the fire was under control. 1,000 feet of hose was sent from Albany.

The entire loss, including the cars, not counting the insurance, is estimated at \$100,000.

## Receives Buenos Aires Paper

W. H. Thoms, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Thoms, who is in Buenos Aires, Argentina, working for the Standard Oil Company in geological research work, sent a copy of the Buenos Aires Herald of August 11 to his mother in this city.

It is a seven column, eight page paper and in make-up and general appearance is about the same as papers in the United States. It has a good run of advertising. This copy is Volume 47, number 6148; is printed in English and some articles are in Spanish.

Arrangements for seating the people was under direction of Spencer Ely Post of the American Legion, and it is said that in spite of the fact that the majority of the thousands who attended arrived at the same time, they were ushered to their places without any rush or confusion.

The service was opened with "Lead Kindly Light" sung by the Ukrainian Chorus, after which the Rev. Dr. I. B. Harper, pastor of the American church, offered prayer. This was followed by a number of addresses and closed with Mendelssohn's Funeral March as a recessional.

## Oregon to be in Movies

Ezra Meeker, northwest pioneer and trail blazer, was the guest of his grandson, Lloyd Templeton of the Albany garage, for a short time Thursday morning. He was accompanied by Prof. Avarid Fairbanks, University of Oregon instructor and sculptor, who has been making a bust of Mr. Meeker at Eugene.

On Monday Mr. Meeker spoke before the Portland Chamber of Commerce in connection with his campaign to raise \$100,000 there and \$100,000 in New York to have motion pictures of the Oregon Trail taken and exhibited.

Mr. Meeker stated that 70 granite markers have been placed on the Oregon Trail by his ox team expeditions. He has spent the last three months in selecting scenes to be filmed along the trail.

In 1907 Meeker started from New York with an ox team, traversing Broadway. He was arrested for driving cattle in the street. He camped in New York for a month, until Mayor Hylan gave him permission to continue with his team.

Mr. Meeker is 93 years old, but he is active and careful of his living.

## Plan Outlined to Avoid Grassy Flavor in Milk

When the herd is first placed on pasture or is turned into clover or alfalfa, a grassy taste is often caused in the milk for a short time, not only making the milk objectionable to trade, but affecting the butter taste as well. This can usually be eliminated by starting the herd on a change of pasture, or a pasture from confinement, gradually.

Do not leave the herd on the new pasture too long the first day—a few hours in the morning or afternoon, supplementing this with some grain and a dry roughage such as silage. The silage can best be saved during the time of good pasture, after the cows have gradually been allowed more time in the pasture, as it will make a good supplement for poor pastures later in the summer. After a week or ten days, cows producing twenty pounds of milk a day or less will need little if any grain on good pasture. For heavier producers, feed a pound of grain for each six or eight pounds of milk produced per day.

A mixture of 400 pounds of ground corn, 200 pounds ground oats, or bran, and 100 pounds of cotton seed meal is recommended by the Purdue dairy department. Cottonseed meal is especially good at this time, to produce a firm butter with better quality, as well as to tend to check the laxative effects of a fresh pasture. A liberal supply of salt should be available to herds on pasture at all times.

## Ohio Cow Makes Record of Five Sets of Twins

The Ohio Station Bulletin 7 makes note of a cow in the station herd that is reported to have dropped five sets of twins out of seven times calving. Twinning has also been rather common in other closely related cows in the herd. The possibility of establishing a family of cows which would produce a high percentage of twins is suggested, but it is pointed out that of the nine sets of twins recorded six sets were male and freemartin and three were males.

## Home Burned

Wednesday morning about 10:30 o'clock the 5-room cottage of Hynek Faltus, three miles east of Scio was completely destroyed by fire, which caught from a defective flue. Mr. Faltus had gone to Albany, nothing was saved except some bedding and three trunks. The loss is estimated at about \$3,000 with no insurance.
