North Fork Items

The Fawn creek cutoff right of way is being cleared and will soon be open to traffic. This will eliminate the hill by the Walling ranch.

A better and stronger bridge has been built across Heneline creek in lieu of the one destroyed in the great storm of the last of July.

Fishing is said to be the best of the season at present but not many campers along the river.

The Silver King people have improved their road lately and it is

now quite easy to drive in to their place.

John Hart has done considerable work on his quartz claims on the Gold creek and he is said to have opened up some very rich ore.

The Lotz & Larsen mine is steadily trucking ore out to the rail road at Lyons and thence shipping to the smelter. This is the first mine to commence shipping high grade from the Santiam District. Their lower grade will be concentrated in the mill now being erected and the concentrated shipped to the smelter. It is said their tunnel is in over 10000 ft and much extremely rich ore has been opened up.

The corduroy bridges have been planked on the Gold creek road so that it is smooth traveling.

The Silver King cross cut tunnel is now in very near their first ledge which they will cut at a depth of over 200 ft. and results are very anxiously awaited by other people interested in this part of the district as it will prove the permanence of the ores in depth and should show greatly increased values.

A party of 14 people including several ladies were at the Crown mine, Sunday. The swinging bridge across the river was not widely used on this trip most people preferring to cross nearer the earth altho it was much damper.

The tunnel at the crown is now in to the outer edge of the series of cross veins and as the metallic values have steadily increased as the drift has been carried forward it is expected to cut the main ore body within a few feet more. The company will install a gasoline compressor and air drill as soon as possible which will allow for much faster driving.

A new trail from the river to the mine is being laid out which will make the ascent of the mountain much easier and allow for packing by horses.
