Mr. Rowan Whealdon, a gradu-
ate of Reed College, in Portland,
and head of the mathematics de-
partment in the Corvallis high school,
has been appointed director of the
1923 Christmas Seal Sale for the
Oregon Tuberculosis Association
and will visit the entire state dur-
ing the next two months.

The State of Oregon has received
\$168,111.95 from the Forest Service,
U. S. Department of Agriculture,
as its share of the receipts from
National Forest resources during
the fiscal year 1923, according to
an announcement from the District
Forester's office in Portland. Word
to this effect has been sent to Gov-
ernor Walter M. Pierce.

Oregon contains 13,137,447 acres
of National Forest lands. There
are fifteen National Forests located
in various parts of the state.

North Fork Items

Oct. 9

An auto load of people from Port-
land visited the Lotz, Larsen Mine
over Sunday.

The Dawes Bros. are said to have
a very promising property on Boul-
der creek, east of Gold creek. Con-
siderable work has been done on it
in the past. Near it is the Lewis
& Clark mine which is a lead, silver
and gold proposition. Many other
prospects are in the immediate vi-
cinity.

Construction of a wider trail from
the foot of the mountain to the main
tunnel of the Crown Mine will be-
gin within a few days so that a
compressor and drill can be moved
in as well as other supplies by the
aid of horses.

It is reported that the Silver King
mining Co. have let a contract to
Chas. Brown for 200 feet of tunnel
work in the main cross cut. Low
water in Henelin creek has inter-
fered somewhat with running the com-
pressor but with the heavy rains of
the past week plenty of water is now
to be had.

Work on the Fawn creek cut-off
is progressing forward and is now
partly graded.

The Lotz, Larsen lode is said to
be 50 feet wide in certain places as
exposed in their 1000-foot drift on
the vein. They are sorting the ore
for shipment and preparing for mill-
ing operations on the lower grades.

reason of the peculiar action of our
county court and budget committee
in turning down the appropriations
for Extension work in Linn county.
We who are making any success
at all of our businesses are engaged
in dairying which to my mind is the
most important and profitable indus-
try in Linn county. We were just
about ready to organize a cow test-
ing association of which I am an-
xious to see succeed. Now it ap-
pears that all action in this respect
must cease because we will have no
county agent to keep the work lined
up and running smoothly.

It seems to me that by all means
some action should be taken to keep
this work going. If the budget
committee is too ignorant to see the
value of it or the county too poor to
put up \$2300 to which will be
added \$2650 more from outside the
county to finance this work I will
be one of a number of other farm-
ers to help finance the work.

Cannot something be done thru
your paper to stir up interest in this
and still put it over?
