Now that these roads are placed in good condition, it behooves the residents along this road to continually and forever to be urging the highway commission to pave this road. It can be accomplished if every man will interest himself in the matter. Remember, in unity there is unlimited strength.

Dr. E. H. Hobson and wife are soon to leave Scio for Salem, where the doctor will open an office in the Bank of Commerce building. We are sorry to lose these good people, especially so since there is no effort being made to hold all we have and trying to secure others to come among us. Shall we let our population dwindle, or shall we as a people try to hold them and secure others? This is a serious question and needs much solid thought.

Typhoid Shows Increase

Records of the State Board of Health for the past two or three months show an increase in the incidence of typhoid fever at various points within the state. As is well known this disease is generally transmitted through personal contact with patients or carriers, through polluted water supplies, or through contaminated milk carelessly handled by carriers at the dairy or on the routes, and also by contaminated foods that have been handled carelessly and exposed to flies.

A study of the situation made by the State Board of Health points to the probability that most of the present cases are due to the use of polluted waters, used for drinking purposes, especially from polluted streams around industrial camps, and contaminated wells and cisterns in the smaller town and rural districts. Some cases are also being reported that are evidently due to contact with carriers who have emigrated from other states where the disease is prevalent. Few cases have been reported from towns and cities that have a pure water supply. Warning is hereby given therefore to avoid drinking water from old wells and cisterns or streams of questionable origin.

Clamping The Oregon Boot

On top of all kinds of freak legislation, Oregon is asked to experiment with a state income tax. Oregon has high millage taxes; pays a big federal revenue and income tax, and on this is to come a state income tax.

The legislator and state officials were elected upon a pledge to reduce taxation and give the state consolidated departments.

In violation of all this and failure to keep all pledges, new taxes, more officials, and more boards and commissions were created.

The state of Washington and Idaho retain their cabinet or department system, reduce their state millage taxes, and repudiate state income tax.

California, the most prosperous state in the West, levies no state millage taxes and repudiates the idea of a state income tax.

Will the voters on November 6th clamp the Oregon boot tighter, and prevent muchneeded investments of capital and industrial development by enacting a state income tax? It is up to the voters November 6th.
