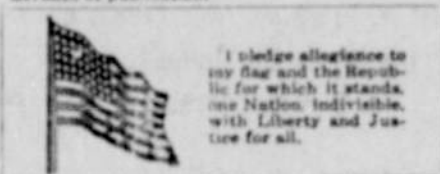

Too Much Extravagance

Secretary Mellon says: "The American people cannot have lighter taxes and indulge in such extravagances as bonuses and similar luxuries. Only a very rich country could stand our complicated and expensive system of government. British taxes sound very heavy, but in actual fact average Englishman pays less than the average American. Since 1920 state taxation has risen while federal taxes have been reduced. Since 1913 the per capita increase for 18 states has been from 100% to 200%."

Damages Orphanage

Damage to the extent of about \$20,000 was inflicted on the Christian Home Orphanage at Council Bluffs, Iowa, by floods from excessive rains and cloudbursts on the night of September 28 and 29. Every building at this great institution was damaged, the heating, lighting and power plants rendered useless for several days, and the store rooms in the basements of the buildings were flooded and thousands of dollars worth of supplies ruined. This is the worst catastrophe that has ever befallen this work, and comes as a serious blow when the institution was already struggling to free itself of debt. This institution is non-sectarian, receives orphan and destitute children from all parts of the country and is supported entirely by the voluntary contributions of charitable people. It is appealing to the public for a Thanksgiving offering to help overcome the losses by the recent floods and to meet running expenses in the daily care of two hundred and fifty inmates. We have had calls from those in distress in foreign climes and have responded to them. Here is a good work right here at home that has met serious trouble and is now asking us for help. Bees do not hibernate during the winter but keep the temperature of the hive above 57 degrees by muscular activity. The colder it is outside the cluster of bees the warmer it is inside. As a result, when bees are not properly protected in the winter they consume an unnecessary amount of honey and waste a large amount of vitality. This activity

also causes an excess of moisture in the hive.

Apple tree anthracnose infections have not made as much progress as usual this fall because of the unusually dry condition is the opinion of H. P. Barsa, pathologist of the Oregon experiment station. Growers who have found the disease troublesome but who have not sprayed will find it profitable to put on a thorough coating of bordeaux mixture, 6-6-50, at once.

If honey combs are stored inside they should be fumigated with carbon bisulfide to prevent infestation by wax moths. Combs that are outside during the winter are not subject to wax moth attack. Carbon bisulfide is inflammable but it will not give good results where the temperature is below 60 degrees F. Sulfur fumes have proved effective in wax moth control.

Buy only the best bee supplies. This is especially important when purchasing hive bodies and frames. A metal telescop cover will be found far superior to any other article in the damper sections of the northwest. Order supplies early so as to have everything ready before the rush of spring work starts.
