Dr. S. C. Browne Starts Silver Black Fox Industry

Dr. S. C. Browne is to receive a pair of Silver Black Fox from Mr. Dale M. Haskings, who is the proprietor of the Silver Black Fox farm which is located about a mile west of Newberg. Mr. Haskings has just received a shipment of twelve pair of these valuable little animals, from W. K. Rodgers of Charlottetown, Prince Edward Isles, Canada. Dr. Browne's pair of Silver Black Fox cost him \$1800.00 and \$90.00 duty. He will have them here in a few days, he expects to raise these valuable animals. They are valued at from \$1,000 to \$2,500 per pair. They litter twice a year and have from 1 to 10 pups, or average five. The Silver Fox Industry in the U. S. and Canada is valued at over \$20,000,000 of which about \$8,000,000 represents the U. S. We wish Dr. Browne success in his new undertaking.

Use of Christmas Trees App By U. S. Forest Service

Large quantities of young Douglas firs were reported to have been shipped from this state this year to California and Hawaii to be used as Christmas trees. Oregon's firs will thus help to make it seem like Christmas in balmy Honolulu. In the United States 5 million Christmas trees are used each year, and in the eastern States with their relatively dense population, trees suitable for use at Christmas are becoming scarce. This year the New England crop was shut off on account of a quarantine against the spread of the gipsy moth. On the Atlantic Coast it is reported that it is becoming profitable to grow Christmas trees. Some day we may come to that in the Northwest.
