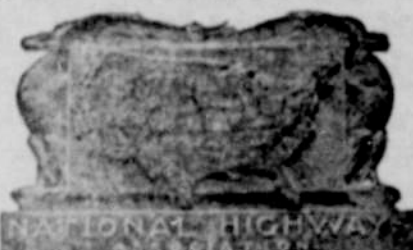

DRUNKENNESS ON THE ROAD

It is high time the legislative and judicial authorities began to consider the crime (the word is used advisedly) of drunkenness when driving a motor car as something infinitely more serious than is drunkenness under ordinary circumstances. Prohibition is as yet too new for the world old opinion of the drunken man, as one to be laughed at, pitied, perhaps put to bed to sober up, fined a small sum as a public nuisance, to change, at least overnight.

But drunkenness which can harm no one but the inebriated man is one thing; drunkenness which is a menace to all who use the streets and roads, and which via the car, converts the otherwise innocuous victim of his appetite to a potentially wholesale murderer, is entirely something else.

Sentiment is swinging over to regarding the drunken driver as one who commits more than a misdemeanor; but it should swing faster and go further. The man who, drunk, drives a car or truck, is a madman; a man without sense, without reasonability, without judgment. He puts in jeopardy the lives of men, women and children. He endangers property. He may cause frightful loss of life, hideous maimings, terrible accidents. No maniac with a gun is allowed upon the streets; the man who deliberately makes himself a maniac and fits himself out with a car loaded with potential death for many, should be dealt with with the utmost severity. A few dollars' fine, a few days in jail, the loss of a license, are not enough. The man who runs amuck with a gun, killing and maiming, gets years behind the bars. The man who runs amuck with a car while drunk is even more culpable.

Let judges once get it through their precedent bound legal minds that it is not the drunkenness, but the drunken driving which is the crime, and our already crowded hard roads will be safer for us all; our children, our women drivers, as well as our sober citizens protected, as they have a right to be, from a menace which has no excuse, legal or social, for existing.

That religion is not on the toboggan slide is evidenced by the fact that 52,121 men attended a men's bible class in Kansas City, Mo., on Sunday, Nov. 11, and nearly 20,000 attending to the same duties in Long Beach, Calif., on the same day. The right leader, the right teaching, will continue to draw men to the house of God, even in this unsettled time. Preachers and teachers must learn now that men are concerned about material as well as spiritual things, and that men will not attend a bible class in considerable numbers and

discuss the topics suggested in lesson leaflets—men want to discuss live questions under religious surroundings, and will go where this can be done. Kansas City and Long Beach prove this.

This is presidential year and politics is already beginning to boil. It looks now as if the primary ballot will be the largest ever issued since the primary system came into existence in Oregon. We would announce our candidacy for some one of the many offices to be filled this year, but we just can't make up our mind which office is big enough for us to aspire for.

One of the urgent resolutions this city and community should make at the beginning of the New Year is "Beautify that which we have, keep all the people and businesses we have healthy, happy and prosperous, and by honest methods try to induce others to come among us and live."

Many Interests Interested

Representatives of many agencies interested in Oregon's agriculture will participate in the state-wide agricultural economic conference that is to be held January 23 to 25 at Corvallis. Producers of poultry, crops, all kinds of livestock, fruits and nuts, and dairy products will meet with bankers and businessmen in thoroughly analyzing problems of production and marketing and in formulating a state-wide program that will serve as a guide to future development of the state's agricultural resources.

The conference will be organized along commodity lines, the various groups meeting first in separate sessions and later reporting their recommendations to the entire conference, where each report will be harmonized with all the others.

Percales to be Higher

While the cold winds are blowing, the manufacturers of percales, cotton prints and shirtings had their minds on the warm days of spring and summer when light clothing will again be comfortable as well as modish. That is to say, these manufacturers increased the prices on cloths to be sold for the next warm season.

The advance in the case of percales is half a cent a yard for the light-ground goods and $\frac{1}{2}$ of a cent more for the dark-ground fabrics. Prints were increased $\frac{1}{4}$ a yard. Shirtings were advanced about $\frac{1}{16}$ a yard. These increases are in addition to the advances made early in November.

Farm Surplus Largely Fruits

Wheat, dairy products, beef, pork, sugar and corn furnish 80 per cent of the calories, and a like amount of the fat, carbohydrates and protein that enter into the nation's food supply. That fact has a relation to the future of Oregon's agriculture because the large surpluses of Oregon's agricultural products are found in fruits and berries.

This and similar factors that influence the growing and marketing of farm products in this state will be considered at the agricultural economic conference to be held at the Oregon Agricultural College on January 23 to 25.
