Read The Budget

Elsewhere will be found the budget for the city of Scio for the ensuing year. This is published to comply with the old law before the last legislature passed the tax conservation commissions for counties. The supreme court has declared that law unconstitutional, and if all tax levying bodies want their taxes for current expenses, they will have to comply with the old law and publish the budget for the ensuing year. The county assessor has given all bodies until 45 days before April 5 to properly comply with the law, and if this is not done there will be no taxes in some instances to collect. Hence the Scio budget is published.
