MEN WITH VISION

These are days that tax men's ingenuity, and the man with vision is the one who makes a success of all his undertakings. A farmer goes out in the spring and prepares his ground to receive the seeding he wishes a crop from. He visualizes on the fertility of his ground and the probable returns from the seed sown. He then works the soil, turning it over and over as the days go by, and when the crop is harvested he is either happy or discontented—he does not quit or throw up his hands if it is a failure, but tries it again next year, until he brings forth what his vision pictured.

A lesson may be learned from the farmer by the business men, who, when trade is slow and stocks not moving as fast as he thinks it should, begins to shout hard times and no business. The business man has a recourse the farmer does not have—he can advertise his wares and bring people into his store to get his goods, but the farmer has nothing to sell when his crop fails. Henry Ford does not make his profit on one or two cars sold per month, but by small profits and a large volume of business monthly or yearly. It is quick turnover and small profits that bring in the coin for him. He started with nothing, and his vision brought him untold wealth. He is no different in composition from the ordinary man, but he used his head to perform work most men perform by their feet and hands.

Men with a vision make it a point to attend every convention held by his calling, he visits regularly the wholesale houses with whom he does business, does not depend upon a salesman to give him all the information about how goods should be sold, and keeps himself thoroughly posted on the business practices of his fellow business men in other parts of the county and state. The farmer, when he wants to try something new, makes a study of the crop, its saleability, its productivity, and if his soil is adapted to it; he gives it the best attention possible and is usually successful. Business men with a vision want to make their store a little better trading place than his competitor's, and success is his when he does—and judicious advertising turns the trick for him.

That woman juror in Portland, who caused her withdrawal as a juror in pending cases, has rendered a service to the jury system, even if she did "cuss" while in the jury room. Her cussing was caused by too much smoking and chewing tobacco by the male members, and because of the lack of intelligence, she says, of the members composing the jury. From some of the decisions arrived at by the jurors, we can agree with her on the intelligence question. And on the smoking and chewing too. It does seem out of place for a woman to swear at any time, but no doubt was permissible in this case.

Just now congress is engaged in the herculean task of "investigat-

If propaganda is not used to influence legislation, why do Senators and congressmen frank so much stuff to their constituents to help them solve worthy and unworthy legislation. If congress would spend the time used in "investigation" of this and that to enact remedial legislation for the masses, there would be no need for propaganda. Half its time is used in useless efforts, and the other half is useless.

Now that Linn county is organized into one big community club, and all boosting for Linn county, watch the county grow in population and in businesses. This is the logical view to take and will be taken more and more as the influence of the county organization functions.

Millions Are Starving, Says General Allen

In a letter just received at Oregon state headquarters for the American committee for relief of German children, 715 Corbett building, Portland, among other things Major-General Henry T. Allen, former commander of American troops in Germany and now national chairman of this relief work, said:

"My survey of the evidence has convinced me that Secretary Hoover is fully justified in saying that 20,000,000 Germans are now in serious danger. As is always the case in such emergencies, the most acute suffering is to be found among the children and the aged. The childhood of Germany is now gravely menaced by lack of proper food and clothing and the diseases resulting therefrom."
