Mt. Hood Gains New Fame

Recognizing the almost universal appeal of the Mount Hood region to travelers, mountain climbers and tourists, the Forest Service has changed the name of the Oregon National Forest to the Mount Hood National Forest, effective at once.

This change is made in an executive order signed by President Coolidge on January 21, the confirmatory notice being received by District Forester Cecil on Jan. 28. The Portland office of the Forest Service recently recommended this change giving reasons concurred in by Forester Greely, the Secretary of Agriculture, and finally by the President. An executive order was also signed on the same date changing the name of the Washington to Mount Baker National Forest.

The region around Mount Hood has long been a playground for Portland people and is destined to become the pleasure ground for thousands of people, not only from the entire Northwest but all over the United States, federal officials believe.

National Forest Visitors

Field reports received at the District Forester's office in Portland show there were 1,576,290 visitors in 1923 on the twenty-two National Forests of Oregon and Washington. The National Forests thus prove themselves to be the great summer playgrounds of the Pacific northwest. Forest officers believe the above estimates of figures to be very conservative. This number of people fished, camped, picnicked, hunted or traveled on the 27 million acres of the National Forests and represent an increase of 548,312 over the 1922 figures. The above figures are for national forests only in Washington and Oregon and do not include visitors to the National Parks in the two states.

O.A.C. Farm Reminders

It is customary to run the incubator for several days before the eggs are put in to maintain an even temperature. Many thousands of eggs are spoiled annually because this advice is not followed.

Moss and lichens on fruit trees may be quickly destroyed during the winter by spraying with ordinary lye at the rate of 1 pound to 6 or 8 gallons of water. If San Jose or other scale is present add live dissolved in a little water to the usual winter strength lime-sulphur. Thorough spraying of this solution will remove both the moss and the scale. Lye removes moss most rapidly but not permanently. For permanent prevention the usual Bordeaux spray is recommended. Applied for apple tree anthracnose, peach leaf curl, and prune and cherry blossom blight it will prevent the moss from developing.

Start preparing the brooder house as soon as the eggs are put in the incubator. Clean and spray it thoroughly, put some clean sand on the floor, and make certain the heater is working properly.

A successful farmer is the one who takes advantage of the experiences of others. Bearing this in mind, the farmer can make the best use of his time at this season of the year by catching up on the reading that he has neglected during the summer.

Food for the Shipwrecked.

On lonely little islands scattered over seven seas Great Britain has placed stores of food and other necessities for shipwrecked crews who might be washed ashore. Altogether, 24 islands have these stores of food. Three are established on the most remote corners of Iceland, while the others are all on smallest of numerous islands dotted about the South Pacific and Indian oceans.
