## O.A.C. Home Pointers

Try scraping new potatoes and carrots with a copper mit, such as is commonly used in scraping pots and pans and washing them. Slip the mit on the hand and rub the vegetables in it. This is a great time saver.

Baked custards will not curdle if they are put in a pan of water to bake. The water should not be allowed to boil.

In making meringues, use 3 table-spoons of sugar to one egg white. Place in a moderate oven that will take it about 15 minutes to brown and you will have a meringue that will keep its shape.

If soft custards curdle, beat with a Dover egg beater until smooth.

Oranges are better than milk for the mid-morning lunch. They are high in vitamin content and do not deaden the appetite as milk does.

Animal crackers dipped in chocolate make a nice surprise for the school lunch box.

Fruit preserves may be made with far less sugar if salt is used. They must be kept a few days before using, so that the salty taste is no longer distinguishable. Allow ½ cup of sugar and ¼ teaspoon of salt to each pound of fruit.
