Now that Daugherty has resigned from the cabinet, does it mean that a clash will break out between the Irish and English?

Senator McNary sends us through his publicity manager, a lengthy interview had with a large wheat grower of Eastern Oregon who is in Washington in the interest of the McNary-Haugen bill. We would like to use it, but so much of this free stuff for private boost is being sent in that we have drawn the line on all.

Next Monday night will be a good time to hitch up old Lizzie and bring the whole family to town. The biggest bet of the season will be explained. We refer to the Community Club meeting and all who attend will go away feeling more kindly to his community, his county and his state. And then all will begin working together for a greater Linn county.

It's wonderful just now what the legislators are doing for the dear people. Hardly a mail comes in now but that it contains a detailed report of some stupendous undertaking or back-breaking load the legislator is attempting or carrying in the interest of the people. Two years of dormancy ought to get them in good shape physically to "work" for their constituency, but we are afraid the superfluous "fat" taken on will wind them before they reach the goal.

Since Eugene E. Smith has turned his attention toward the United States Senate, instead of Congress, Senator McNary has announced his intention to return home and look after his political fences. Probably this decision is not because of the entrance of Smith, but because of the other two gentlemen who have been in the game for several months. But Smith has a program all his own and is capable of making himself heard all over the state. And he is a fine speaker and a good debater, and if nominated and elected would bring considerable prestige

to the state of Oregon in the national capital.

THE TARIFF

It is said that there is considerable doubt as to the McNary-Haugen bill passing the senate, and that it will not pass the house. If this is true, it will stand the farmer, the laborer and the business men of our country in hand to watch his senator and representative in Washington, and see that neither of them get to go back to represent the people in the national capital.

Most congressmen want a high protective tariff on wheat, urging that program as the remedy for existing ills to which the farmer is heir. There was nothing farther from the mark than that belief. The importation of wheat with a high tariff such as has been the record in the past was never stopped, and would not be stopped now, unless the tariff was based on a more scientific basis than any tariff before. The ad valorem system never reaches the difference in cost of production between the United States and other countries, and this lets wheat or other products into our country at a less price than production costs here. The correct solution of the problem is to place a tariff on any product so that the duty on it will make it cost delivered here the same or more than the home product, and this will shut out the importer, if the American people are really in earnest to patronize home industry if all other things are equal. For instance, if it costs \$1.90 a bushel to raise wheat in the United States, and it only costs 75c to produce it in France or Australia, the difference in price would be met by adding \$1.15 duty to the foreign wheat. We cannot see but this would help solve the matter of tariff, and would also keep foreign stuff off the American Market when American industry is overloaded.

Congress might spend a few profitable days in studying this suggestion, and then ask the farmer, the manufacturers and other industrial agencies what they think of the question. If they would do this, we venture the assertion this will bring a great outburst of indignation of throttling a legitimate business—importing—by the men who make their millions off of the American public through advertising that they are saving the people money by bringing in foreign products at less price than the home product is bringing. They never say that the imported article is sold higher than the home article, oh, no, but it always is.

Nevins National News Special News Letter

Washington, D. C., April 1, 1924
—The Johnson immigration Bill is slated for consideration the first week in April. The opposition to it is vigorous, but not numerically strong enough to prevent the consideration or passage of the measure by the house. The bill must be passed before the present law expires by limit of time, on June 30 of this year; if not there will be a deluge of immigration into this country limited only by the capacity of facilities for transporting people here.

Crater Lake National Park will receive \$100,000 per year for three years, or \$300,000 in all, when the bill that passed the House recently for an appropriation of \$7,500,000 for roads in national parks becomes a law. There is every reason to believe it will be enacted at this session.

While the Committee on Rivers and Harbors have not formally decided to report a bill at this session,

Congressman Hawley has been advised that this will be done. This bill will be of special interest to those interested in the Siuslaw river, where there is a project favorably reported for removing the shoal caused by the North Slough below Cushman, and to those at Port Orford, Coquille, Yaquina, and Skipanon, where surveys are desired. Mr. Hawley believes these will all be included in any bill reported.

The adjusted compensation bill that passed the House contains two provisions not included in any bill previously passed by either House of Congress. First, it provides that where veterans of the World War have died before the bill becomes a law, the widows, children, or other dependants of the veterans shall be paid the amount of the adjusted compensation in cash in ten equal quarterly payments. The estimated cost of this provision is about \$52,000,000 and will provide relief in this amount for those who are greatly in need of it. For instance, a widow whose husband was entitled to \$500 adjusted compensation will receive ten payments of \$50 each. Second, the bill provides a sinking fund for the payment of all obligations arising under the bill, and this will reduce the cost to the government to nearly one-half of what would be required were no sinking fund established.

When the Committee on Agriculture of the House of Representatives began consideration of the McNary-Haugen Bill, there was a serious division of sentiment among the agricultural interests of the country and their friends over the best way to provide relief for the present agricultural depression, and to enable farmers to receive remunerative prices for their products. Gradually those interested in this legislation have been coming to an agreement upon the McNary-Haugen bill as the best legislation at this time. The Chairman of the Committee expects to have the bill favorably reported in a few days.

Pension bills introduced by Congressman Hawley have been included in omnibus pension bills and passed by the House for the relief of Mrs. Harriet M. Miller, Harrisburg, Oregon; Edward Jackson, Durkee; Henry E. Kiste, Astoria; Mrs. Elizabeth J. Wright, North Plains; Miss Lilly Hudson, Newberg; Mrs. Minerva J. Smith, Tangent; Mrs. Eliza M. Traylor, Beaverton; Mrs. Ida S. Ross, Salem; Joseph Bauer, Mt. Angel; Mrs. Martha A. Greenough, Sutherlin; Chas. D. Felter, Empire City; Jeremiah B. Thomson, Oregon State Soldiers' Home, Roseburg; Mrs. Katherine E. Soper, Eugene; and Benjamin H. Craven, Dundee.
