O.A.C. Farm Reminders

Clover Crops in the orchards will be plowed under this month by the fruit growers of Oregon, reports the experiment station.

Old apple leaves are a menace in Oregon apple orchards. Practically

all scab infection originates in the spring from spores carried over the winter by old leaves. Plowing the old leaves under in apple growing sections will help prevent scab infections. This practice is an important supplement to the experiment station spray program.

The quality of the potato crop cannot be improved and yields kept up to standard without rotation, says the O. A. C. experiment station. Disease and pests accumulate and reduce yields rapidly when potatoes are grown on the same ground year after year. Treating the potatoes before planting will prevent infection from surface borne diseases.

Dusting has not been demonstrated as a satisfactory substitute for orchard spraying through the entire season under Oregon conditions, according to experiment station observations. The quickness and convenience of the method makes it useful in connection with vegetable growing and with home orchards where a large proportion of extra fancy fruit is not considered absolutely necessary.

The spray program for 1924 includes not only the latest revised program for commercial growers but an abbreviated program for home orchards. It is carried in extension bulletin 369 which will be sent free by O. A. C., Corvallis.
