President Coolidge is now ready to extend aid to delapidated Europe, since the Daws report has been accepted by the powers affected. This should have been done a few years ago, and all this trouble since would have been minimized.

McAdoo was in Portland for a few hours last Sunday, and the stalwarts were there to meet him. Of course, it being Easter Sunday, he made no extended address except a short talk around the breakfast table. Like his namesake here in Scio, he likes to eat—and talk.

You use the forests when you build a home, when you eat a meal, when you read a newspaper, when you go camping or hunting, when you drive an auto, when you ride on a train, when you go to a movie, when you build a fire. To preserve the forests, remember these simple things and see that you put out the fire when away on a camping or hunting trip.

When it comes to making a hit with the chamber of commerce and other commercial bodies, the Linn County Open Forum is there with both feet. Portland Chamber of Commerce has asked for the plans of the local county organization, and of course got them. What better tribute could be paid to such an organization, when its formula is to be broadcasted?

First steps have been taken in Portland looking toward the formation of The Northwest Prune Federation, as the central sales agency for all northwest dried prunes, organized for the purpose of standardizing and advertising and marketing not less than 70 per cent of the dried prunes of Oregon and Clarke County, Washington, which would represent a minimum tonnage of about 35,000,000 pounds of dried prunes, based on the average of production.

A 15 year old girl has been brutally murdered in Portland. And in her home while alone. A poker was used to fell her and other brutalities inflicted upon her body. Is leniency toward law-breakers to blame for this wave of crime? Does the pardon power granted to the pardon board have any effect upon crime toward its easing up? Forest Rangers' Cook Book

FIRE PUDDING
Take a liberal slice of our timber-covered mountains, sprinkle liberally with auto campers (be sure and get as many careless ones as possible), garnish well with tailor-made cigarettes and bake and brown with un-extinguished camp fires.

HOT CAKES
Take a hunter out of season, an angler without a licence and a camper without a fire permit. Put in one game warden and one forest ranger and stir until well mixed. Place in the Justice Court. Remove the officers and season the balance with judicial advice and bake in the county jail for 30 days.

ANGEL FOOD CAKE
Take 1 dozen careful campers, 1 dozen law-abiding hunters, and 1 dozen licenced anglers, place in a nice shady camp, where all cans and refuse have been buried, mix with one ranger, sprinkle with interesting songs, stories, and jokes and serve during summer evenings.

HOT BUNS
Get a nice plump city dude who has just thrown a cigarette stub into dry brush, cover with arrest, shake off all excuses, get a commitment (Judges' brand preferred), and let boil 90 days in the county jail. If very tough, boil for a longer period.

PERFECTION PIE
Take 2 cattlemen and liberal supply of campers. Have cattlemen drive cattle to camp ground and salt. Have campers dog cattle away from salt and water. Mix with personal opinions and serve separately with Irish temper and forest officers.
