The Mercer family, accompanied by Mr. Cross spent Sunday afternoon in Salem.

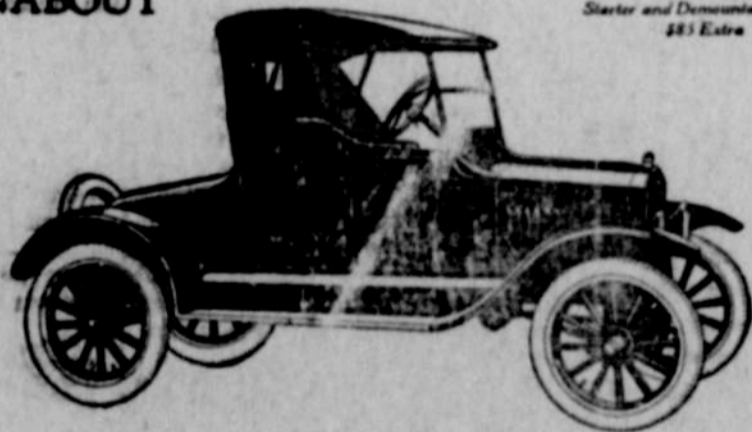
