likes to live in Oregon, because of the healthy climate, made so by the snow-capped mountains and clear waters of its mountain streams and rivers; he likes Oregon because the sturdy stock of the white race ever wended westward, and Oregon was the last of the frontier settlements; he likes Oregon because its men and women are the best in the world in state building, in home and school building and in sociability; he likes Oregon because the mien temperature in winter is 43 and in the summer it is 65 degrees; he likes Oregon because of its abundant rainfall and abundant crops, and what better climatic and living conditions could one want the year around; he likes to live in Oregon because any crop can be grown here, and because diversity in farming can be used to best advantage. He said he had no use for the pessimist or knocker, and told a story of a man who had run the guantlet of both. This man became so isolated because of his bad habits that he decided to commit suicide, so he bought a rope to hang himself with, a pistol to shoot himself with, some poison to help the other two items along, and then some coal oil to finish the deed by burning him up if the other three failed; then he jumped in a boat and floated down stream until he came to a big limb overhanging the stream, threw the rope over it and then tied the rope around his neck, poured the oil on his clothing, took the poison, set fire to the oil and placed the gun against his ivory dome and pulled the trigger—the bullet glanced and cut the rope, he fell into the water which put out the fire, the stragulations caused by sucking water into his stomach made him vomit out the poison, so he had to swim like the dickens for the shore to save his life; but he ran for the legislature, was elected and became a booster. The speaker said he knew it paid to be an optimist and booster, and hoped the young people present would catch the spirit of the times and keep Oregon to the front, where she is today.

Casey Smith of Sweet Home sang "Just Plain Folks" in a pleasing baritone voice, and as an encore rendered a love song. One of the speakers commended him highly and predicted a bright future for him if he would take advantage of his voice and train it.

M. D. Shanks of Lebanon summed up the evening's program and the program of the Open Forum in a most pleasing manner. Mrs. Graham of Albany followed in a happy vein and said she hoped the present plan of meeting together and in one organization should remain, for do not men need the tender, guiding spirit of the womenfolk? Jefferson Myers was called upon for a few remarks, telling of some duties of the state treasurer, and expressed his happiness in being able to attend such a worth-while meeting of the people of Linn county, his old home.

Gift Campaign Inaugurated

The campaign inaugurated in behalf of the University of Oregon to obtain \$5,000,000 in five years through gifts has reached the active stage of its progress. On May 9 there will be inaugurated by the University alumni who have taken upon themselves the task of raising \$1,000,000 of the scheduled \$5,000,000 as their share, a three weeks' intensive drive. Former students of the University everywhere the world over, are to participate.

Necessity is the spur which is driving the University of Oregon gift campaign. Attendance at the University is increasing so fast that it is outgrowing the facilities. Attendance within the past four years has increased 39 per cent. During the same period the University's income from the state has increased but 5 per cent. All of the University's buildings are crowded. Some of them are over-crowded. Not only is the attendance growing, but the rate of increase in the attendance is growing. These facts and the further one that the University prefers not to ask appropriations from the over-taxed public for increased facilities, furnish the reasons for the gift campaign.

This campaign was inaugurated a year ago, but it has only recently become fully organized and begun to attain real headway. The first big effort of the campaign is that to be made by the alumni from May 9 to May 30. With the \$1,000,000 which the alumni propose to raise it is intended to provide a new library, a gymnasium and a splendid memorial court. Citizens of Eugene in a mass meeting held recently have pledged themselves to provide \$500,000 for a splendid auditorium to be built on the University campus, big enough to accommodate from 5,000 to 6,000 students. At present it is not possible to hold an assembly of all students indoors, because there is no building at the University which will accommodate the 2,400 students now in attendance. The current student body has pledged as its contribution to the gift campaign the funds necessary to supply a building for the Students' Union.

The alumni of the University are taking the lead in the campaign. After they have completed their share of the work and the fund, a similar drive to theirs is to be made among the citizens of Oregon generally. Through the alumni drive it is expected that the scope and purpose of the plan will become familiar to the public generally, so that the progress of the state-wide campaign to come later will be facilitated. Efforts also are being made to enlist the contributions of persons of means everywhere who have special reasons for interest in the University of Oregon.

The "kick-off" of the alumni intensive campaign on May 9 is to take the form of drive dinners. Wherever there is a group organized for the campaign, in Oregon and out, that group will get together at table on the evening of May 9 and launch the drive.

Will Ride in London

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NEW MODERN BUILDINGS
FOR ALBANY COLLEGE

Rapid Progress Being Made Through-out the State in Campaign to Raise Funds for Expansion Purposes.

Albany student self-help college, located at Albany, Ore., is to have at least three modern new buildings in which to house its many departments of education, when the campaign now on throughout the state is finished and \$500,000 is raised for expansion purposes. Rapid progress is being made in organization work, according to J. Henry Lang, director, at headquarters in the Multnomah hotel, Portland.

At Albany college, every student entered must earn all or part of their way by some of the various methods of work employed, it being the policy of the school thus to inculcate habits of the students carrying their own load, the college lending them a helping hand while doing it. It is believed by the faculty and trustees that this better fits a student for life work, hence it is made obligatory.

Friends of Christian education are being enlisted in the campaign and the response to the call for service has been splendid. Because of the excellent record of the college and the splendid field of opportunity in the northwest, it is believed that a like response will be forthcoming when funds are asked for to put the school on a thoroughly standardized basis as to buildings and productive endowment. Albany college already has \$212,000 productive endowment, but to enlarge its scope and to provide more self-help facilities, it is necessary to have the additional \$500,000, \$100,000 of which has already been subscribed in Albany and vicinity.
