DECORATION DAY

Tomorrow is Decoration Day. It is the day set aside by many states and observed as a memorial to the departed dead who have given their lives that this country might exist and be free and independent. That it might be one and indissoluble. That it might become the leader among nations in manhood, in righteousness, and in progress.

No other day should have the attention of our people more than this day. It is a day of hallowed memory to the boys who gave their blood in 1776, in 1861, in 1898 and in 1917. It is in memory of those still living, who have become bent with years, who are either left physical wrecks or maimed for life. It is in memory of these that we should pause during this day and lift our hats and bow our heads for them. It is in a measure the flag going by, the rechristening of the nation to its cause of freedom and upholding of the integrity of its manhood. To this end we should comply with the proclamation of our president and governor and commemorate the deeds of the valiant dead and living.

On tomorrow, instead of passing the day in frivolous pleasure, we should take stock of the present day tendency and ask ourselves if we are doing all we can to make this the nation our forefathers and our boys fought for. We should bear in mind that moral forces are at work to tear us asunder and that

only eternal vigilance will abate. Are we doing our share in upholding the laws of the land? Are we taking personal liberties that lead us to the jails? Are we cautioning those of our friends who are breaking the laws against such carryings-on? Do we do our duty when serving in juries and try the cases according to law and evidence and not according to our own version as to the merits or demerits of the law?

Tomorrow let's pay homage to the fallen heroes and rededicate ourselves to the cause of freedom for which they fought, bled and died. We should not do less.

SPORTSMANSHIP

In a lengthy writeup of the ball game here last Sunday between Albany and Scio, the Albany Democrat showed its sportsmanship by maliciously attacking the local team and the Scio fans because of their remonstrance against the game being stolen by the Albany Umpire, Al Senders. The attack does not amount to much so far as it goes, but when that paper urges the fans of Albany to use violence in more ways than one, it certainly does not show good sportsmanship, because it says: "Albany fans will be sugar-mouthed next Friday night according to the indications that arise from the miscellaneous maledictions being poured upon the heads of a few Scio fans and one Scio umpire by members of the Albany team and Albany fans who witnessed the game."

The above would indicate that the Albany team will use every means at its disposal, with the help of fans, to steal the game by fair or foul means. It means that hoodlumism is sanctioned by that otherwise peaceful publication and how serious it might become has no remorse for it. Sportsmanship lies in taking your defeat as men, without maliciously attacking the visitors. And in this role the Albany Democrat is not sportsmanlike. Despite the fact that the paper approves the ruling of Umpire Senders, he did purposely call a Scio man out at home after the catcher had muffed the ball and failed to put the runner out. The Democrat admits this when it says: "Albany outthit the

Scio men, out played the Scio men and out-argued the Scio men, but nevertheless lost the game 10 to 9," and then in a tabulated score shows that Albany was at bat 45 times and Scio but 40. Be fair, Albany Democrat, and there will be no necessity of urging or advocating such as you have in your paper. Be a sportsman, because you will admit, the Albany ball team admit and your fans will admit, that Albany refused to play ball in Scio last Sunday unless Senders umpired the game behind the bat. Was it because Senders is so eminently fair that this was demanded? Or, was it because his reputation is such that Albany is sure to win when he umpires a game? The decision came when it looked like Scio was putting over a swat-fest game and would tally with or lead the Albany lead.

If sportsmanship is to be patterned after the Democrat brand, please deliver us. The game Friday can be played on the square, but not with such advice as was contained in the Democrat. A neutral umpire would help do it, and if betting is tabooed. Scio could not bet if Albany was not willing.

We are informed that Richardson Gap folks will be at the Community Club meeting next Monday night in large numbers. They want the next meeting of the club in their midst and we know of no reason why they should not get their wishes.
