After considerable parleying, the local team decided to go ahead with the game, the score at this time being 6 for Albany and 3 for Scio, with the bases full.

In the 5th and 6th innings no runs were made, but in the 7th Albany annexed another run and Scio 3, making the score at the end of the first half of the 9th inning 9 to 6. When Scio came to bat she ran up four scores, thus winning the game. H. A. Ballin was easily the star, making a two-base hit and scoring two runs in the second, while several costly errors were charged up to Cox, who held down the third sack, he muffling as fine a fly as ever fell into a diamond, and allowing many balls to pass him.
