COMMUNITY CLUB ELECTS OFFICERS

Picnic Planned for July Fourth at Richardson Gap, With Music By Juvenile Band

Monday night the Forks of the Santiam Community Club met at the school building in Scio and elected officers for the ensuing year. A short program was rendered, little Ruby Rosprofska sang a beautiful song and responded with "My Wild Irish Rose." She has a splendid voice for one of her age, and her parents are justly proud of her, as are all who heard her sing Monday night. Leonard Lukenbach sang a couple of his school songs without accompaniment, and the audience also cheered him to the echo.

A large delegation was present from Richardson Gap, and when the place for the next meeting of the Club was asked for, the chairman of the delegation, James Oupor, extended a cordial invitation to meet with them. The invitation was accepted, and a motion was made to hold the meeting on July Fourth, with a picnic and business meeting, instead of on Monday, July 7, which was also adopted.

Election of officers for the ensuing year was here called for, and several nominations were made and everyone declined. L. E. Gilkey who has been president since the club was organized, requested that he be not elected for the next term, giving his reasons as being too busy with the county fair and home work, which was reluctantly accepted. J. W. Miller of Shelburn was placed in nomination and unanimously elected. Mr. Miller will make a splendid official and will give the same careful attention to the work of the club as has Mr. Gilkey. The Tribune believes the club will proceed as never before under his guidance.

For the office of vice-president, Frank L. Smith of Lacombe was unanimously elected. Mr. Smith is an enthusiast in community work, and will be a great aid to the new president in forwarding the interests of the Forks of the Santiam.

Mrs. Mylo Bartu was unanimously chosen to the office of secretary-treasurer. R. M. Cain, who was elected to succeed I. V. McAdoo, explaining that his duties occupied his time to such an extent that he could not give the attention to the office which it required. Mrs. Bartu had left the meeting when this happened, and of course could not at that time decline. She is entirely competent to handle the duties of this office, and will no doubt give it her best attention. The membership feels that good and true officers have been chosen to fill the several offices, and will render all assistance possible to them. (On being noti-

fied the next morning of her election, Mrs. Bartu declined the office, thus leaving the position of secretary-treasurer vacant.)

A communication from the secretary of the Albany Chamber of Commerce asking each community to cooperate with the Kiwanis club of Albany in advertising this portion of Linn county to the tourists who visit Bryant park by sending in photos of herds, field or garden, or places of especial interest so that slides can be made, was read and each community urged to comply with the request. There is no expense attached to this, so send in your photo.

A committee composed of F. L. Smith, R. M. Cain and Mrs. D. C. Thoms was appointed to work with the Richardson Gap people in putting on the picnic July 4 at the latter place, for which the Richardson Gap folks will furnish the music and assist in every way possible to make the day a success. A juvenile band from Mill City, we understand, will furnish the music for the occasion.

L. E. Gilkey has been appointed manager of the Linn county fair for 1924, and has already begun active work on making it a success. He asked the people of the Forks to cooperate with him by furnishing an abundance of display material, which can be secured through putting on a community exhibit here on the Saturday before the county fair opens. On motion it was decided to hold the community fair in Scio, and from the exhibits at that time the county exhibit be made up. A committee composed of S. H. Goin, N. I. Morrison and Mrs. J. W. Miller was named to assist Mr. Gilkey from this section.

One of the great steps forward in community work was the elimination of membership dues, and all residents of the entire Forks are thereby made members whenever they come to the meetings and can therefore take part in all the proceedings. If the dues have prevented any from taking an active part in community work, there will now be no excuse from becoming affiliated with the great movement.

Bridge Contract Let

Last Saturday the State Highway Commission let the contract for the construction of the Harrisburg bridge, and work no doubt will soon be commenced. There were eleven bidders for the construction of the bridge, ranging in price from \$183,200 to \$237,115. The Portland Bridge Co. was the lowest, and consequently received the contract, the bid being \$183,200, while the Pacific Bridge Co. was the highest. D. C. Thoms attended the awarding of the contract to look after the interests of Linn county. The right of way to the bridge at Harrisburg has been secured by the city.
