One reason for low prices and high taxes is the placing of money in tax-exempt bonds. Recently in New York City something over \$50,000,000 was invested in Liberty Bonds, which sold at 120. Can anything be more plain than that congress ought of right to the people of this country repeal that infamous law?

Gov. Pierce is to be commended on his decision to investigate the sanity of Abe Williams, sentenced to hang. It is said that Williams

has the mentality of a 9-year-old, and that his actions in the pen demonstrate it. Williams is said to have killed a man in cold blood in Wasco county two or more years ago. He is an ex-service man.

When a subscriber stops his home paper, usually the thought is that he has also stopped the press—at home. If found guilty they should be given good stiff sentences as a lesson to those who might want to follow in their footsteps; if proven blameless, it will be good for the world to know that there is no such thing as bridge scandals or the malicious spending of public money by incompetents or grafters.

It is now high time our college managements take cognizance of the many societies being organized within its confines. The recent murder in Chicago of the Franks boy by "intellectuals" in the Chicago University, and of an earlier episode in Montana when one of the professors and some students "stuck" up the postoffice should be sufficient proof of the need of investigating these so-called societies. It is beyond the power of comprehension to believe that our colleges and universities are harboring such men and women who deem life and property of so little moment as to rob and kill.

THE NATIONAL CONVENTIONS
The republican national conven-

tion will convene in Cleveland, Ohio, next Monday for a four-day session, with great fireworks display on the lake front showing life-size panorama of President Coolidge. It is estimated that between 40 and 50 thousand people will attend.

The democratic national convention will convene in New York City Monday, June 23d, and it is said W. G. McAdoo now has enough votes to land him the nomination. It is too early to predict just what each convention will promulgate in the way of platforms, but it is safe to say they will give ear to the demands of the people for reduced taxes, help to the farmer and laborer, lower commodity costs and other items of paramount interest to the average citizen. It is also probable a plank will include the repeal of tax-exempt bonds so that money will come into the open rather than go into hiding.

Albany defeated the Scio ball team in Albany last Friday by the score of 7 to 3. It was a hard fought game and the home run of Spillbrink failed to make but one run on account of the fact that there was no one on bases. Senders and Ring umpired. It is estimated about 1000 people witnessed the game, and Scio's share of the receipts was but \$62, and at 50c per capita admission.—You done well boys.

One of the peculiarities of the elections is shown by the recent primaries in Linn county. Of all the candidates for representative, but one is from the rural district, and that is S. H. Goin, all the rest are from Albany. Mr. Goin is a real dirt farmer, and understands the needs of the farmer, and we believe he will be elected to the office to which he aspires.

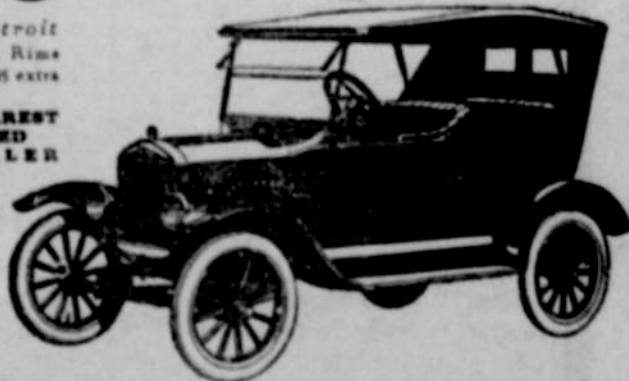
