DOES HOME TRADING PAY?

Probably no question has been asked oftener than "does home trading pay?" especially in rural communities since the automobile has become of such importance in life.

No one who has studied the question from either a business, social or economic angle will answer the query in any way but the affirmative, because they have observed from study that the community or state where its citizens are pulling together and patronizing each other there is contentment and prosperity.

The belief, and it is shared in by a very few in each locality, that the productivity of the farm, the mill and the factory of other communities or commonwealths are better than that at home, is fast waning, and it is because of getting to-

gether and understanding each other—a realization of the fact that money at home means money in circulation at home, that \$100 in the local bank means greater security to the local home than \$10,000 invested in oil stocks in Texas or Mexico.

When we get the idea firmly imbedded in our minds, be we laborer, farmer, merchant or banker, that where we earn our livelihood, there we should spend our money for the products of the soil, for the goods on the shelves and the clothing we wear, then we will see our community, our county and our state grow. It is like an endless chain, when we buy Oregon made products—the money keeps circulating to the laborer, the farmer, the merchant, the banker, and then makes the circle over and over again.

Oregon grown products, Oregon made products and Oregon for Oregonians should be our slogan in practice, not theory. When we get this fundamental in mind, we will see Oregon with 3,000,000 in the next 10 years.

Therefore, when we buy Oregon made goods we are helping create Oregon payrolls; when payrolls are established, more products of the farm are used—thus trading at home pays.

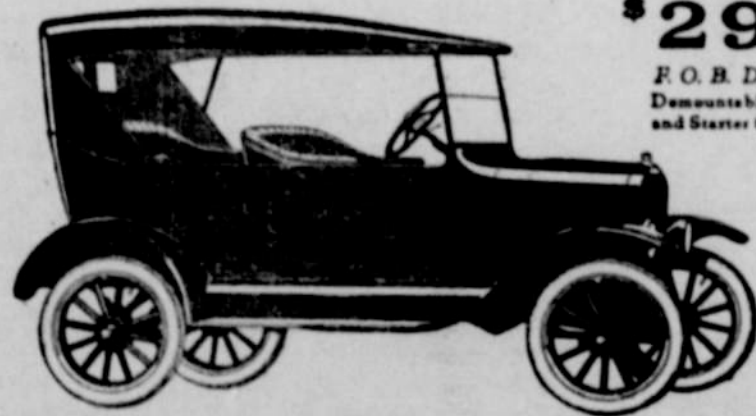
Notice of Final Settlement
