

Buys Big Farm

The Albany Herald said Tuesday: "Completion of the first sale of Linn county land to have been influenced by the giant realty syndicate which was capitalized at \$275,000 and organized to speculate in Linn county tracts, was reported today when J. Fred Braly of the Willamette Valley Land company sold to Perry J. Long of Portland the 336-acre farm of Sam Knox of Knox Butte.

"Mr. Long is formerly of Canton, Ohio, and an acquaintance of Judge Murphy of Cincinnati. He quoted Judge Murphy, who is a member of the board of directors and an appraiser of the Union Central Life

loans, as saying, 'Out of the 39 states in which we loan money, we find no better land than is found in Linn county, and we have less trouble with loans in Linn county than in any of the 39 states.'

"As soon as he gets the land in first class shape, Mr. Long says he will be in the market for additional acreage."
