Brodie, so we are not going to shove our stock in the pot until we see how the dealer handles the cards. The mere mention of our name at this time we fear will cause Cal to recall Mr. Brodie, as we promised to stay out of politics until Brodie had climbed the ladder until the height began to make him dizzy.

Oh, boy, it's terrible to be so popular, and we didn't know we was until now.

"TILLAMOOK ON THE RIND"

The above caption is worth more to the people, especially the dairymen, of Tillamook than any other phrase, and more than all the present money in the banks of that city and county. A broad statement to be sure, but a fact. "Tillamook on the Rind" is a slogan that sells Tillamook cheese and guarantees the purchaser of a high grade, always uniform product, an article that commands a 10c premium above any other cream cheese on the market today. To keep this slogan before the public costs the cooperative cheese plants (there are 24 of them) \$30,000 a year in advertising, and a small portion of the premium money pays the bill. They believe in advertising and back it up with a superior cheese, uniform the year around.

Tillamook county is just an ordinary western Oregon county. In fact it can grow nothing we cannot grow here, yet the unimproved land brings from \$600 to \$1000 per acre—they raise some grain, but they claim the ground is too valuable to farm and pays better as pasture for their fine herds. There are few pedigreed herds in Tillamook county, but great attention is paid to cows with production records, grades or pedigreed. All dairies are sanitary and the herds are healthy, kept so by the cooperation of the state, county and the cheese cooperatives.

The dairymen there know what it means to them in a cooperative way and remain steadfast with the organization. We saw no cream buying stations in any of the towns of Tillamook county, yet the dairymen are receiving 62c per pound for butterfat. Is this high price because of no competition in an open market, or because of a tight cooperative organization? Every dairyman will tell you it is because of their co-operating together and faith in the managers. Competition means "a price for all kinds of cream measured by the poorest produced in a community, while under cooperation the poorest will not be bought at all until it is brought up to standard." That's why 62c is paid in Tillamook and about 40c here. Let this percolate in your mind and then begin to cooperate in this community and county.

"Tillamook on the Rind" catches the eye, and once tasted the purchaser will always ask for "Tillamook" cheese, made in "the land of cheese, trees and ocean breeze"—and cooperation there succeeds.

The political fireworks will begin exploding in August. We have all brands, guaranteed to give you that patriotic feeling and dizzy emotion. Oregon has a candidate for president, a socialist by the name of Johns; then the republican, the democratic, the independent, the prohibition, the American, and there may be others. Take your choice and get as hoarse as you like.

Fires have done untold damage all over Oregon during this unprecedented dry spell, and we cannot be

too careful. The dead grass and weeds around many homes are invitations for a burned out city. Why not protect your property as well as others by removing these dangerous hazards? Safety first!

Happy is the man who owns a few good cows, and he would be happier yet if all dairymen were organized and had a high standard to maintain, for then they could get a better price the year around. It's being done other places, why not here?

Accidents are getting fewer on the highways. In a 277 mile drive we only saw one damaged car, and it was not bad. Maybe all the speed fiends were in jail, the hospital, or—the grave. Let's hope the latter place holds them.

A Serious Grass Fire

Last Friday afternoon some people who were passing noticed a grass fire near the J. W. Shimanex house on route 1. The house is unoccupied and but for the heroic work of neighbors the house and all other buildings would have been consumed. About two and one-half acres was burned over.

Some fire fixhetra, who were returning from the forest fires near Mill City stopped and gave their assistance in extinguishing the flames. It is thought to have caught from a cigaret stub.

Exposition Building Burns

The Pacific International Livestock Exposition building was completely destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon, July 23, all within half an hour. The building cost nearly \$500,000, with insurance of \$350,000. Reconstruction will be commenced immediately, following closely the architecture of the burned building. The exposition opens Nov. 1 and extends one week.

Has Double Misfortune

Mr. Frank McDonald of Redmond, Oregon, a former resident of Scio, suffered a double misfortune on Tuesday of last week. While his farm home was burning to the ground, and his ten-year-old son, Frankie, was assisting with carrying small articles away from the flaming building, he was run over by a truck.

The boy is lying in a plaster cast, his spine probably fractured.
